Deceased had a stroke of paralysis last June and never fully recovered from the attack. She had been a member of the M. E. Church for over 40 years.

Cornelius—The new residence of C. C. Hancock will soon be occupied by Mr. Wilkins, late from the East.—W. R. Phillips, who has been visiting with relatives for two weeks, started Monday for Lind, Wash., taking with him several boxes of Oregon apples.—The wind did considerable damage in our town Tuesday night. It completely demolished the barn of Mr. Tongue, of Glencoe, used by Mr. Fairchild, of this place. There was considerable hay and straw stored in the barn. A cow was tied in the structure, but escaped uninjured. The mess house of Patton & Holscher was blown off the foundation, wrecking it badly; the store building occupied by Mrs. Matthews was jarred up some, breaking some of the windows; the summer kitchen of Mrs. McKinzie was destroyed and many fences blown over near town.—The Wolf Brothers have rented the Scholfield place for next year.—C. C. Hancock, who is visiting his sister at Peoria, Ill., will return to Oregon in a short time.—Dr. Everitt, of Gaston, has moved into the Wilcox house.

The wind of Wednesday morning was a terrific gale, and close observers say it was the highest wind for twenty years. Telegraph and telephone poles, trees, old barns, and fences were blown down in all sections of the county. The baseball ground fence was flattened to the ground on one side, this being the greatest damage in this neighborhood. Above here however, the damage was considerable. At Cornelius there were several cases of injury to property.

The Grangers north of Glencoe held a fair at the Arcade school, on the last of the week.
