THE GOVERNOR'S RIGHT.

Of course one can not expect politicians who are opposed to Governor Chamberlain to agree with him that he should have assurance that the proposed extra session should remedy the tax law and then adjourn. They have axes to grind and they want to set the grindstone of graft to turning. In the Multnomah county delegation those opposed to the attitude of the governor are known to be legislators who are in touch with a rotten ring in municipal affairs—and they want free license to run things with a high hand. As a matter of fact, any legislator who has the good of the state in mind, and who thinks his county needs an extra session because of the taxation muddle, will at once put himself in touch with the ideas of the executive—that is, to have a session, pass the necessary legislation and adjourn, with the least possible expense to the state. But this is not what is wanted. The real desire is prompted by the big fellows back at Washington, who want to be prepared for an emergency, so that no bridges are burned behind them.

There is no necessity for general legislation. There is a constitutional and legislative time for general legislation and that time should merit the tolerance of all legislators. The governor has taken quite the proper position and small politicians should not bar the way for remedial legislation. The people of the state will stand back of Gov. Chamberlain in his asking for assurance that endless general legislation shall not be indulged in. If there be no extra session the fault will lay with those who have less regard for the state than their individual desires.

Senator Dietrich, of Nebraska, has been indicted by the Federal Grand Jury, charged with having sold a postoffice. This man Dietrich is posing as a purist, but he has been notorious as a boodler politician for many years. He is now moving heaven and earth to have the U. S. District Attorney removed, and, as the Senator is very close to the throne, and Nebraska being a very close state, the administration may have to move or suffer defeat in the land of corn and blizzards.

Ex-Congressman Moody has been acquitted and exonerated—and during all this time of tempest and trial, incited by political and business enemies, the government has been putting up thousands of dollars to satisfy the spirit of malignity. Mr. Moody's bank, which the Controller closed at The Dalles some years ago, under the protest of Moody, has paid all its claims in full, from the assets of the bank. Mr. Moody has bested his enemies who use the wheels of government in an attempt to blacken his name; he has just concluded a successful term of congress—and surely, that is glory enough for any Oregonian.

Grover Cleveland is liable to arrest for violating the Virginia game laws. This is not the first time that this honorable gent has shown a remarkable regard for the disregard of law.
