### FIGHT ON LIQUOR QUESTION OVER

Members will have whatever they want in refreshment line

The big liquor fight is about to be solved at Forest Grove in the incorporation of a Commercial Club, organized under the laws, and doing business as a corporation. This will mean that the members can elect a steward and have all the liquor refreshments they want, just the same as any club in Portland. Liquor will be sold only to members of the institution.

This mode of procedure, it is thought, will do away with the incessant wrangling over the beer and whiskey question, and the program is said to have been outlined by lawyers of ability.

County Judge L. A. Rood officially visited St. Mary's Home, at Beaverton, Tuesday, and reports the institution a credit to the public and to the Catholic people in charge. There are 26 orphans and one foundling, all males, and under the age of 14 years. For those the State allows a maximum compensation of \$50 per year, each. Besides these state charges there are about sixty more little lads attending the school and staying at the home, many of whom are either fatherless or motherless, those having parents being there for the school advantages. The Judge reports everything neat and clean, and an evident wholesome discipline prevailing. One of the little chaps readily read an Oregonian for the benefit of the Judge. The boys are all taught to be industrious and cleanly about their person, and they are instructed industrially as far as the limited means about the school will permit. The management will try to get a Catholic set to found an industrial adjacent to the school and home, so that the boys may leave the place finished in character. Mr. Moore, the present manager, seems to be the man for the place.

## AN UNFORTUNATE FRENCHMAN, LEGER FOUGERON BY NAME, WAS PICKED UP BY THE OFFICERS TUESDAY EVENING, AND APPEARED TO BE SUFFERING FROM SOME MENTAL DISORDER.

He was placed in the County Jail, and, in his own language, keeps saying, "I am guilty; let me die; bring the rope I am ready." About one hundred dollars was found on his person, and he was fairly well dressed as laborer. A poll tax receipt from Flathead county, Montana, was found among his effects. This bears the date of May, 1903. He also had a letter to the James H. Sewell ranch, where he evidently expected to go to work. Among Fougerson's trinkets is a medal of honor from the French hospital service, where he seems to have held a position in 1895 and 1896. He is being held for a day or so until the French consul at Portland can be placed in possession of the facts.
