EVENTUALLY COMING. Here in an agricultural community where we all know the solidarity of our business men and bankers, there is a proneness to not give much study to questions of banking; and where we have good crops and a ready market, a lack of interest in trusts and what they mean to the buying common people. But the time will come, eventually, when government postal savings banks will be established everywhere, thus saving the laborer and the depositor from irresponsible banking concerns; we shall public ownership of railways, operated by the government, as they are in Germany today, saving the real payers of transportation millions each year; we shall have life insurance issued by the government at a slight expense above, if not at cost; we shall have government control of natural resources, like mines and oil wells, and, perhaps, government manufactories. All these things will come, in time. It is not Utopian, any more than our post office system. Neither is it more likely to prove a failure than that system. We shall then have no more grafting in our public affairs, if properly regulated, than we now do, and the public mind is getting ready to consider these reforms. It may take years to get around to it, but it will come.
