CORONER IMPANELS AN INQUEST JURY

John Oliver Met Death by Accidental Drowning.

DISPELS SUSPICION OF FOUL PLAY

Was Drowned April 9, and then Neighbors Started Story of Fool Play.

On April 6, John Oliver, aged 76, was drowned in the Nehalem river, beyond Buxton. His body was recovered and buried seven miles beyond Buxton.

There was no thought of an inquest and after the burial it became currently reported that Oliver had been killed and his body thrown into the river.

Sheriff Sewell and Deputy District Attorney E. B. Tongue went to Buxton Tuesday and, Coroner Large being present, the body was exhumed and examined for evidence of foul play.

There was none, and a jury impanelled, declared that deceased met death by drowning.
