THOS. WITHCOMBE'S ARTICLE.

Thos. Withcombe, of Farmington, has a column article in Sunday's Oregonian that is certainly one of the most logical, as well as well written, articles, that has appeared for months. While Mr. Withcombe goes after the democratic Wilson bill at the close, for fear some one may take his letter as partisan capital, in another place he says, speaking of the tariff on wheat:

"We have a tariff on wheat that looks just as ridiculous as placing a cow's tail between her horns. It does not protect the farmer, and the same thing is the matter with our merchant marine. We have our freight ships protected, but yet they are swept off the face of the earth and our clever and brave America captains and owners are sailing ships under the tricolor of France or the Union Jack of Great Britain. When wheat was worth \$1 a bushel you could scarcely buy a farm in the Willamette Valley, the farmers were prosperous and many had bank accounts, etc."

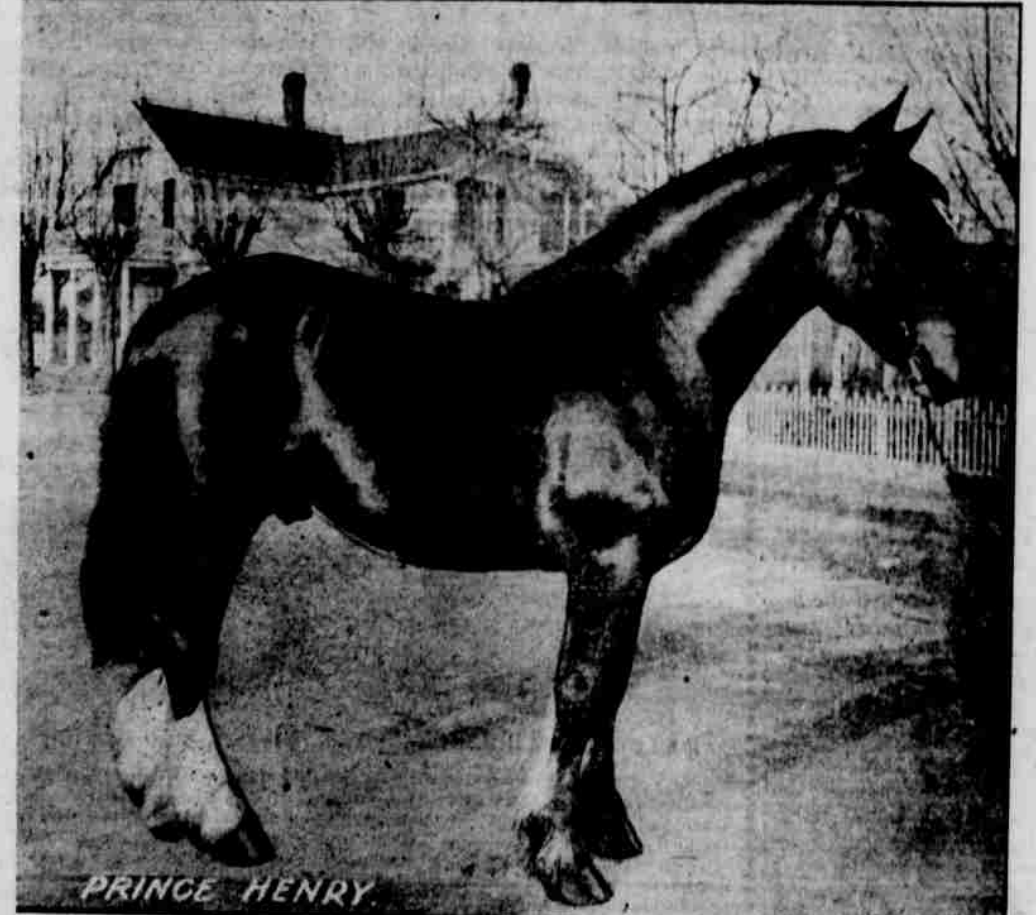
