Louis Neil, a Pendleton farmer, was killed this week by an O. R. & N. train.

John Kennedy, of Brooklyn, N. Y., a survivor of the British charge at Balaklava, is dead.
California has instructed her democratic delegates for W. R. Hearst.

At New Westminster, B. C., houses occupied by Chinese, who work in paper mills at half white labor prices, have been dynamited.

John M. Gearin, attorney, asks for a new trial for T. A. and Hosea Wood, convicted of fraud in procuring Indian War pensions.

Bancroft, the Portland Postmaster, must go, says a report from Washington. Burckhardt, whom Bancroft fired—his assistant—has been reinstated by the Washington authorities.

A report is published this morning that Japan lost two ships, one a first class warship, carrying 741 men, and the other, an armored cruiser, by getting afoul of Russian mines near Port Arthur. The report is not officially confirmed.

The Oregonian threatens libel because of assaults by the Portland Journal on the record of Binger Hermann, and the Journal laughs at the threat. The Journal has only repeated the charges of last year. A libel suit threat is as old as the whiskers of Father Time, in politics.

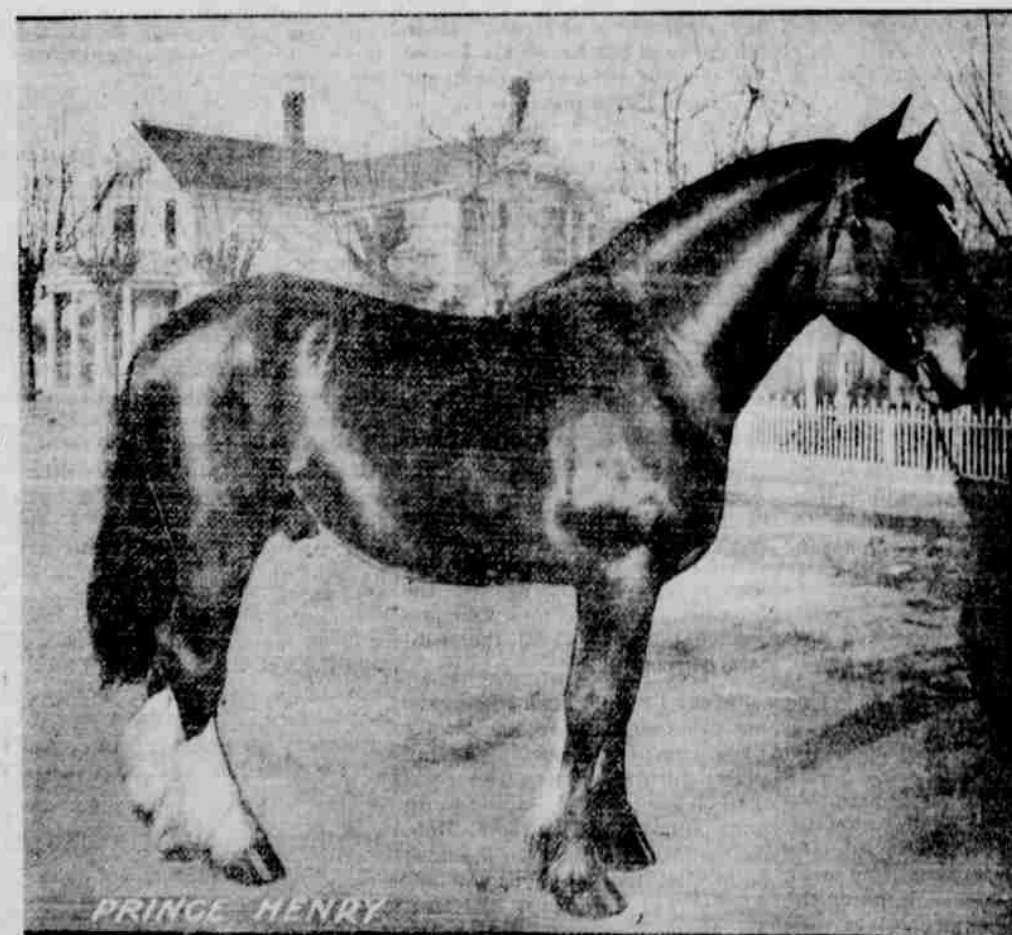
