

ALL IS CONTINGENT UPON PROPER SUBSIDY

Messrs. Sewell, Shute and Heidel Can Raise the Money

IF GRAYDON WILL GIVE INSURANCE

Graydon Wires that He can Float Bonds if Subsidy is Raised

James H. Sewell was called to Portland Monday evening to hold a conference with the agents of the Graydon, the senior member of whom is now in the East, interested in capital in the Portland-Hillsboro electric line.

Mr. Graydon had wired that he could close a contract to buy the bonds provided the subsidy asked for some time ago were raised. Mr. Sewell returned and held a consultation with Messrs. Shute and Heidel, and these three gentlemen came to the conclusion that they would ask Mr. Graydon to give them positive assurance that capital would take the bonds if the balance of the subsidy were signed, and to this end they have reported back to the Portland office.

Whenever they get this assurance—and they expect it in a very few days at least, they will proceed to get the remainder of the sum asked for.

ELLA V. MILLER.

Miss Ella V. Miller, aged 17 years, 9 months and 26 days, died at the home of her parents, Mr. J. C. and Mary J. Miller, near the Arcade school, Wednesday, May 18, 1904. Miss Miller was the sixth child of the family, and is the fourth to die within nineteen months from that dread disease, tuberculosis. Some twenty months ago they contracted scarlet fever and the measles, and never fully recovered, and this aided the malady which caused their death.

Deceased leaves a father and mother, and four brothers, George, now here from Heppner; Chas., at Oakesdale, Wash.; Esie, at Heppner, and Frank, at home. The funeral takes place this Friday morning, at 11 o'clock, services being in the Arcade school house.

BIG CHURCH ANNIVERSARY.

The 60th anniversary of the founding of West Union Baptist Church will be celebrated at that church a few miles northeast of Hillsboro, Sunday, May 22, and Edward Lenox, on whose father's claim the church was built, and who is a surviving founder of this, the 1st Baptist church organized west of the Rockies, will come from California, to attend the meeting. There will be preaching at 11 by Rev. A. J. Hundesaker, of McMinnville, then a basket dinner and reunion, followed by a sermon by Mr. Latourette, also of McMinnville.

This church was organized May 23, 1844, and 8 years later on Dec. 25, the present building was dedicated. Aside from a new roof and foundation, the building stands as built by Wm. Kane, now of Forest Grove.

This meeting is of much significance, as many who met and worshipped in the log building and the new one, shortly after it was built, will commune again together and live over those dear old days when the Lenox Donation was a common point of interest.

Wm. Schulmerich, candidate for the legislature on the Union ticket, and who has been engaged in the dairy business near Farmington for a number of years, was in town Tuesday, and says that his neighborhood is still dairying with great success. Mr. Schulmerich has a herd of 27 Graded Jerseys, and he keeps them for winter milkers, largely, and by this method, to say nothing of the increase, he has, within the last 12 months, received from these cows, \$2,178, or an average of \$80.69 to the animal. This is a splendid record, considering that 13 are two and three year olds; 8 are four year olds, and the balance matured cows. Mr. Schulmerich has been sending his milk to the condenser all season.

The Supreme Court, Wolverton, judge, has handed down a decision that should be of interest to every hopgrower in the state. Virtually, it says that the one-sided hop contracts are valid, and that lack of mutual interest is all right. In other words, if the hopbuyer having a contract to buy on his hands exercises "his honest judgment" as to the quality of hops, and finds them in that judgment, not good, he need not buy. This means that if prices go down, all that is necessary for him not to entail loss, is to reject the crop under contract on the grounds that "his honest judgment" declares that the hops are not good. The way for growers to contract their crops is contract them in such manner that the grower can force purchase, and immediate appraisal of the quality of the hops, by capable judges, and then there will be no trouble about one sided contracts.

J. J. Meacham, of Mountaineer, was in town yesterday, and was nursing a wounded foot, caused by a bicycle accident. Geo. Howe is responsible for it—all because he induced Bro Meacham to get on the front seat of a tandem bicycle and take a ride. The wheel was going too fast to suit the "boy" in front and he "broke" the wheel with his foot and came near breaking his foot as well. He was wearing nothing but a carpet slipper, which was of no protection, and he sustained a badly bruised foot. J. COUNTY FINANCIAL CONDITION EXCELLENT

Over Forty Thousand Dollars Ahead of Debt.

MONEY FOR SEVERAL MONTHS' WET

No Claimant Awaits Payment, but gets the Hard Cash.

Business is business—and Washington County enjoys the unique position among Oregon counties, which in the main, are debt ridden, of having the hard cash to meet running expenses for many months to come. When a claimant against the county gets his warrant he walks into Treasurer Jackson's office and gets his check without any delay. With the money in the treasury, and the money in taxes now being figured to the various funds in the sheriff's office, Washington County has \$43,000, or nearly that figure, to apply on county general and road purposes.

County Treasurer Jackson now has \$24,030 in the county general fund, and \$8,363.22 in the road fund. Sheriff Sewell yet has under computation about \$30,000 to turn over, and of this \$18,000 will go to the treasurer today, and the balance as soon as computations on the many funds are made.

This healthy condition, even if taxes have been high owing to an outrageous state levy caused by heavy appropriations.

There is yet enough coming on the half-payment taxes to more than pay the balance due the state on the October half-payment of tax, and old Washington county isn't paying one cent of interest, which certainly is an excellent advertisement to people looking for a home.

LIQUOR CASE TRIED.

The case of the City of Forest Grove against A. G. Watson, one of the deferred liquor cases wherein Watson was charged with selling liquor to Geo. Markes on Feb. 29, was tried before L. C. Walker, city recorder, of the Grove, yesterday; Watson found guilty and fined ten dollars and costs.

The complaint and original warrant were lost, but this did not stop the case, at all. As a matter of fact, under the law, the complaint in such cases must be in court, so the case is worth nothing. Aside from this, the ordinance does not provide for imprisonment in case of default of the fine, so Watson refused to pay, and there the matter stands.

Attorney E. B. Tongue demanded the complaint, or discharge of the defendant, and stated that while he could not prove it, he was satisfied that he knew who got away with the complaint, and that it was put out of the way for a monetary consideration.

MARY RAMSAY WOOD CELEBRATES BIRTHDAY

Will be 117 Years of Age Tomorrow.

BORN IN KNOXVILLE, TENN., IN 1787

Crossed the Plains in 1853. Making the Journey on Horseback

Hillsboro doubtless has the distinction of having the oldest inhabitant of the United States. Grand-ma Mary Ramsay Wood is the personage, and she has lived in three centuries, the 18th, 19th and 20th. Tomorrow, surrounded by her daughter, grandchildren and great grandchildren, and friends, she will celebrate her 117th birthday anniversary in this city, where she has lived since 1853.

Mary Ramsay Wood was born in Knoxville, Tennessee, May 20, 1787, and lived in that vicinity



until she was a woman of mature years. Her father was one of the Knoxville's first brick masons, and a subscriber to the Knoxville Gazette, the earliest newspaper published in the state. Ramsay worked on the capitol building, Knoxville being the first seat of government, the capital remaining there until 1802, when it was removed to Nashville. Ramsay was a relative to the historian of that name, the author of a Revolutionary War History.

Mrs. Wood crossed the plains in 1853, then at the age of 66, and a great portion of the arduous trip she made on horseback. That fall she settled in Hillsboro.

Mrs. Wood resides with her daughter, Mrs. C. B. Reynolds.
