Mr. Zahler had been burning some brush and logs about the place and the children, three boys and the girl, were playing around the fire. The fire was nearly out when the father and older boys went away leaving Frieda and Walter, aged 4, playing near the fire. Shortly after Chris Dappan, a neighbor, who was passing by, heard screams and hastening up to the children, found Frieda enveloped in flames. He hastily put the fire out and Dr. Tamiesie of Hillsboro was summoned. He arrived to find the child burned beyond recovery.
