He has given the public a good, courteous service, and the board, as newly organized, thought it better to give it to some one who resided outside of Marion county, and thought Mr. Wiley the right man in the right place.

P. B. Southworth has purchased the Blaser saloon, and hereafter the resort will be known as the "Gem." Mr. Blaser will retire for a while, and enjoy life between gardening, fishing and hunting. The new management will honor all outstanding refreshment checks, and Mr. Southworth will give the business his personal supervision. He will endeavor to make the place popular in the future, as it has been in the past, and solicits a continuance of the patronage the resort had under Mr. Blaser's proprietorship.

Orin John McConnell has sued Mary Matilda McConnell for divorce, alleging personal indignities and cruel and inhuman treatment, such as calling him a "liar, fool," and other and worse names, and that she insulted his friends when he brought them home, and that she repeatedly told him she wished he would leave her. They were married in Clackamas county in 1895, and there are two minor children, of whom plaintiff wishes the custody and care.

BIG FOREST FIRES RAGING IN MOUNTAINS

The Nehalem Country is Losing Valuable Timber.

HOUSE, BARN AND MILL BURN.

Owing to Dry Spell Fires Spread Rapidly. Glenwood Threatened.

Heavy forest fires were raging the first of the week in the Nehalem country and thousands of feet of valuable timber was burned. J. M. Hamlin lost his house, barn and shingle mill, and other property was threatened. The fire ran down the west branch of the Nehalem and gave Glenwood a close call.

Owing to the dry condition of the woods fire spreads very rapidly, and every care to prevent fires starting should be exercised by parties in the mountains.

COMMENCEMENT OVER AT PACIFIC UNIVERSITY

FINEST CANTATA GIVEN AT HALL.

Annual Corporation Dinner Enjoyed by Over One Hundred.

The largest audience of the week gathered in Brighton Chapel, Pacific University, yesterday, to hear the 42nd commencement exercises of Pacific University. The entire front was a mass of ferns and ivy, rising in clusters from the platform, and hanging festooned from the walls. Beautiful bouquets of roses gave color to the scene. On the platform sat the faculty and distinguished alumni of the institution. President Ferrin presided.

The exercises opened with an invocation by Rev. Mr. Bollinger, of Oregon City, after which Miss Waggener, who completes the course in music, gave a beautiful rendition of "Trommerlei," by Schumann.

The degree of A. B. was also granted to Thomas Robinson, who is now at Princeton, which he acquired for graduation at Pacific last year. A diploma from the conservatory was given Miss Wilma Waggener, of Hillsboro.

The annual corporation dinner was enjoyed by over 100 people, Pres. Ferrin presiding as toast master.
