

VETERANS OPENING ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT

Commenced to Arrive Yesterday and Today Many are here

WILL BE WELCOMED BY THE MAYOR

Promises to be one of the Biggest Celebration for Years.

The committee had all in readiness yesterday when the van guard of the Veterans' re-union commenced rolling into town. By last night quite a number of veterans with their families had arrived, and by tonight the camp ground at Warren's Grove was filled with veterans and their families.

Tomorrow morning Mayor B. P. Cornelius will welcome the veterans, and give them the freedom of the city. Hon. H. V. Gates, Past Commander of the Oregon G. A. R., will respond on behalf of the veteran visitors. The afternoon will be devoted to school exercises, and the evening to camp fire reminiscences by the old soldiers. Saturday's program will be supplied, and election of officers will take place, most likely, on that day. There will be balloon ascensions on Friday and Saturday. On Sunday there will be divine services, a sacred band concert, and Rev. W. H. Sellick, of the Sunny-side M. E. Church, will deliver the Sunday sermon. In the evening there will be a sacred song service.

The Fourth of July committee has completed all arrangements for the day, and it promises to be enjoyed by a big crowd. The procession will form at the courtyard square, at 9:30, and march to the grounds. The ladies have a big part of this program in charge, and they pledge some surprises. Arriving at the grounds, Mayor B. P. Cornelius will welcome the visitors, after which Miss Lena Parker will recite the Declaration of Independence. Hon. C. W. Fulton, United States Senator, will deliver the address of the day, and as he is one of the finest orators on the Pacific coast, his address alone will be worth the trip to the county seat.

After dinner the games and sports will begin, and there will be enough of a program to keep things moving all the rest of the day.

There will be a first class vaudeville on the grounds, a fine dancing platform, and scores of other amusements.

The Supreme Court has just decided a case that was appealed from Washington county circuit court wherein T. W. Thompson was plaintiff and B. F. Purdy, defendant. After the mill at Gaston was built Mr. Thompson and Mr. Purdy borrowed \$4,000 from the Shute bank of this city and gave their joint note. When the notes came due Mr. Thompson was obliged to take them up. He paid the paper and then brought suit against Mr. Purdy, who alleged that Mr. Thompson should have paid the notes to stand off money paid out by Mr. Purdy, for other considerations, and claimed that Mr. Thompson denied this, and Judge McBride gave Thompson judgment for a little less than \$2,000. Purdy appealed, with the result that Justice Welferton, to whom the case was assigned, confirmed the judgment of the lower court. J. C. Moreland was Thompson's attorney.

CROPS BADLY IN NEED OF A SOAKING RAIN

Heavy Precipitation Would Mean Thousands of Dollars

FOR WASHINGTON COUNTY FARMERS

Forecaster Seals Promised Rain by Thursday Night. Bad Outlook.

There is a bad outlook for the Washington County Spring grain crop unless the weather man's prediction of rain by tonight makes good and gives us a soaking shower. Unless rain comes within a few days there are thousands of acres of Spring grown grain that will not be worth the cutting and threshing. While Washington County is better off than Yamhill and Polk, being lower, yet it is estimated that as present conditions stand, we shall not have over a fifty per cent. crop. Hay is being cut here and there, and it is light. A good heavy rain would give both Fall and Spring wheat, and oats sown late, a big help, and without it, there will be a light harvest.
