The Russians report that they killed and wounded 30,000 Japanese at the assault on Port Arthur Sunday night. Tokio will not confirm the report, and neither will St. Petersburg, yet Aliexiff, the Russian commander, wires that the loss was all of 28,000. The Port Arthur Russian fleet yet makes trips out to sea, ostensibly to shell transports.

Paul Kruger, the one time president of the Transvaal, is dead.

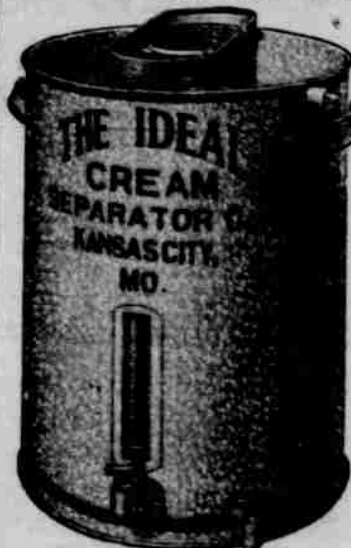
