

HEAVY FROST DOES DAMAGE IN LOWLANDS

One Gardener Loses Nearly a Thousand Dollars

MUCH BEAVERDAM LAND AFFECTED

Serious Loss From Cold Wave, Following Warm Dry Spell

The lowlands of Washington county, particularly along the beaverdam sections along the Tualatin river, suffered a blighting frost Tuesday night, and thousands of dollars in damage was done to the vegetable kingdom. Richard Corri, on the J. C. Hare place, stands to lose about a thousand dollars by reason of the freeze, potatoes, corn, melons, and other garden stuff having been wilted to the ground. A. W. Saxton, of Rock Creek, says the freeze effected the lowlands in his neighborhood, and J. S. Robinson, of Farmington, says his garden was cut to the earth. Andrew Jack, of Farmington, says the frost visited his section, but not to so alarming an extent. Barney Liss, of Beaverton, was in town Wednesday, and says that Geo. Mazzi, the big vegetable grower of that place, is a heavy loser, and that Gus Ross, another grower, also suffers a garden loss. In many places corn was cut to the ground, and the potatoes are so badly injured that the crop will be sadly interfered with.

On the uplands the freeze hurt but very few gardens, but here the drouth is much in evidence.
