Thirty men of affairs have been selected by Mayors Hoge and Cornelius and Judge Rood to represent Forest Grove, Hillsboro and Washington county at large, at the coming convention which organizes the Oregon Development League, at Portland, August 2 and 3. Out of these thirty gentlemen there should be no absent delegate. Washington county stands in a position to be better benefited by any state improvement or development than any other county in the state. Situated close to Portland, with one-half of our population able to reach the metropolis in a two hours' drive, it is of much importance that we place ourselves in a position to receive benefit from organized effort. Let all the delegates attend this important meeting. It is high time for Washington county to scrape the moss off its back and barnacles off the bottom of its public spirit.

The Argus again calls the attention of the Hillsboro business men to the need of a public park for public use. Never again will the town be able to buy a grove at so low a price as at present. The town has no place for open air exercises except the court house yard, and this is very unsatisfactory. We need a grove, close to town, for public service and for celebrations. The Sewell grove, southeast of town, is an ideal location, and this appears to be the only place that can be procured. It is up to the business men to make a move toward the acquisition of this place. The owner, James H. Sewell, appears disposed to permit the city to have this tract, which is amply large for the purpose, at a very reasonable figure. Let the business men get together, raise a part of the money, and the city the balance, and then we shall have a park and grounds, which in five years will be a credit to a town of ten thousand people. Remember, you will be doing this for your children and your children's children. Who will be the first to take up this important matter.

Astoria reports a big run of salmon.

Three Russian torpedo boats have been sunk by the Japanese.

The vice-presidential candidate, Davis, denies that he is to be married.

It is expected that Kuropatkin, the Russian commander, will retreat to Mukden.

The teamsters of Chicago have joined the packing house strike, and refuse to handle canned meats for the firms.

England has notified Russia that prompt indemnity must be made for all Russian slights upon vessels carrying the English flag.

Minister Von Plehve, of the Russian Department of the Interior, was slain by a bomb this morning, at St. Petersburg.

The big meat packers' strike is still on and there is no compromise in sight. Meanwhile, the packers are putting up the price of meat to the consumer.

Tom Taggart, of Indianapolis, has been selected as chairman of the democratic committee, and Cortelyou, republican chairman, says that Taggart owns a gambling house.

Niu Chwang has fallen in the hands of the Japs.

Sheriff Word, well known here, has put a stop to gambling in Portland, and the Williams machine is in misery.

Hope Clayton, a woman of the lower world, committed suicide at Astoria the first of the week. When recovered her body was found to be decked with jewels worth \$1500.

President Roosevelt has been officially notified of his nomination, and accepts in a speech that assumes morality and wisdom as all his own. Now, if Grover Cleveland will only be permitted to write Parker's acceptance, the Argus will wager that the gentleman will skin the Oyster Bay gentleman a full length on the "holier-than-thou" proposition.

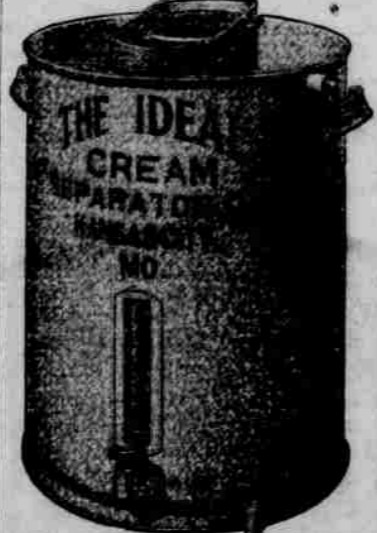
