

JUDGE McBRIDE ADJOURNS COURT

Will Come Back Once Before
Fall Term Opens.

GOES TO OTHER COUNTY SEATS

Court Reporter Runyon will Make the
St. Louis Fair Nearly Next Month

Judge McBride adjourned court Tuesday evening for the term, but expects to return to Hillsboro early in the fall and set a few cases before the fall term commences, so as to get the calendar started in good shape. He goes from here to Oregon City and Astoria and then takes his annual vacation. Court Reporter Runyon starts for St. Louis in a few days, and will forego his vacation this year, except to take a stroll down the "pike."

In 1902 E. W. Nelson purchased the Louis Jesse farm known as the Emerick Donation Land Claim South of Cornelius, Oregon. Previous to that time Mr. Nelson had been a resident of the State of Nebraska. Mr. Nelson died at Washington county, Oregon, in the fall of 1903, and Jas. H. Morrissey, his son-in-law, was appointed Administrator with the will annexed of his estate. Some time thereafter, Effie M. Nelson, daughter in law of E. W. Nelson, presented a claim to said Jas. H. Morrissey, Administrator, based upon the claim that she had at the request of E. W. Nelson paid certain notes given by her husband to various parties in Nebraska. The claim was disallowed by the Administrator and an action has been commenced in the Circuit Court of this County by said Effie M. Nelson against said Morrissey as Administrator of the E. W. Nelson Estate.

Mr. Nelson was a man who was always considered to be honest and above reproach, and it appears to members of his family as though this is an attempt to collect something from his estate upon which he was never liable; hence the disallowance of the claim. Judge McBride made an order that the plaintiff must put up \$50 in court to secure costs, and the case will be tried at the next term. The case of School district No. 12 vs. H. A. Ball, et al., suit over division of school district near Greenville, writ not allowed on ground of insufficiency of return. Estate Wm Chalmers, insolvent; assigned authorized to sell claim of \$16.20 for \$10, to avoid litigation. Harris vs. Harris, Portland action for divorce, decree granted.
