Over one million bushels of the new crop of Northwestern wheat has been sold, at from 70 to 73 cents.

The New York Sun, able and bitter, which supported McKinley two times, still continues to support Rooseveltian policies.

Five people were killed in a train collision inside the Chicago city limits, yesterday, the parties being a mother and four of her children.

Otto Klein, of Portland, only wants \$20,000 damages for loss of a leg, while travelling on the Southern Pacific between Portland and San Francisco.

The Port Arthur Russian squadron is said to have made its way out of the harbor, and it is thought to have started to join the Vladivostock fleet.

Ex-Mayor Donnelly, of Cripple Creek, Col., will move away, as he has received repeated warnings from the foes of the miners, whose cause he had espoused.

Five persons were injured by dynamite exploding in a house at Butte, during the night, Tuesday. It is thought that the perpetrators were after alleged refugees from Cripple Creek, Col.

Nebraska populists and democrats have fused on the state ticket, but will have separate electoral tickets. The fusionists gave Nebraska the best state government it ever had, and the ticket should win out—but it will doubtless be defeated.

Hon. Champ Clark, of Missouri, and a member of the House of Representatives, was chairman of a delegation which notified Parker that the Democrats had named him for presidential candidate. The notification took place yesterday.

Senator Geo. Vest, of Missouri, and who was in the U. S. Senate for many years; a master of perfect English; one of the ablest authorities on the tariff question, and the man who openly told the senate that the recent tariff bill contained a "smuggler" that placed an additional tariff on anthracite coal, died the first of the week. Vest is the one U. S. Senator who resigned because of old age creeping on. He was a Secessionist and served in the Confederate Senate. Missouri mourns him as her foremost and ablest son.
