**Employer Robbed and Hired
Man Went to Tacoma**

MISS REGHITTO GETS MONEY BACK

**Trusted Hand at Her Farm Carried
Away Funds**

Miss Rosa Reghitto, of Sandpit, near Sherwood, was in town Tuesday, accompanied by her father, David Reghitto, of Beaverton. Miss Reghitto has but recently returned from a trip to Tacoma, Wash., whither she went to have one Augustine Reghitto, an Italian, but no relative of Miss Reghitto, arrested for a theft perpetrated last week. Augustine Reghitto and his wife, who was a very clever Italian woman, worked on the Sandpit farm, and were treated by their employer as nicely as though they belonged to the family. One day when Miss Rosa went to Portland, to be absent several days, the hired man decamped with \$152 in greenbacks, an English sovereign and a gold watch chain. This was in April, and nothing was heard of the man's whereabouts until a few weeks ago, when he was located in Tacoma. Miss Reghitto went over to the Washington town and confronted the man, who immediately refunded the money and chain. Owing to the pleading of the wife, who was really a very clever woman, Miss Rosa determined to drop the prosecution of the case. It was a case of confidence misplaced, because the man was trusted in every way. Here is another case of a rascally husband saved through the graces of a good woman. Had it not been for the wife, Miss Reghitto would have carried the case into the courts and the man would have had time to serve.

The money was hidden in the cellar, and Augustine doubtless had seen where it was deposited.

THE ELEVEN SECTIONS CASE TO BE APPEALED

Disputed Strip Will be Carried to Supreme Court

WASHINGTON AND COLUMBIA

**Involved in Litigation Over Land That
has Passed Back and Forth**

The much mooted "eleven sections" case, the matter in dispute between this and Columbia county, will be appealed to the supreme court. In 1898 a strip of eleven sections was cut off of Columbia county and placed into Washington county, upon request of nearly every settler in the strip. It became subject to this county's government, but in 1901 Columbia county, by a little smooth work in the legislature, "stole" it back. Columbia county levied a tax, and so did Washington county. The legislature of 1903 passed the land back to Washington county, and Sheriff Hattan was enjoined from selling the land at delinquent tax sale, the settlers and Washington county joining in the suit, employing Hon. S. B. Huston as counsel. Judge McBride decided against Washington county upon a demurrer, and the commissioners' court has decided to appeal the case. The attorney for the settlers and county is confident that the supreme court will grant the relief and cancel the taxation claim that Columbia county has against the several pieces of land in the disputed territory. Of course, the land is now safe in its Washington county title, but the settlers do not desire to have the cloud over them in the way of an uncollected tax, and they are anxious to have the case cleared up.

HENRY WOOLEY

Henry Wooley, aged 74 years, and who came to Oregon in 1845, settling two miles north of Hillsboro, at Leisyville, died in Portland last Friday, August 5, and interment was at the Buxton cemetery, Forest Grove. Deceased was well known to all old-time Washington county pioneers. For a number of years he has been a resident of Eastern Oregon. He was born in Ohio in 1830, and was but fifteen years of age when he crossed the plains with his parents. The following children survive him: Mrs. E. W. Chandler, Forest Grove; Mrs. F. Breidenstein, Portland; Mrs. F. Walling, Forest Grove; Mrs. John Walling, Amity, and Fred Wooley, of Spokane, Wash.

FIRST LOCAL OPTION PETITION

The first gun in the battle between the liquor and no liquor element will open in Washington county, November 8, 1904, and the battleground will be in the picturesque valley of Dairy Creek and over in the classic shades of North Forest Grove. The fight between the Japs and the Russians will fade into insignificance when this fight gets into full swing. A petition signed by 56 good and trustworthy citizens of those two precincts has been duly filed with County Clerk Godman, and it asks that the election shall be declared to take place on the 8th of November, which will be the first Tuesday after the first Monday in the month, and hence will be on presidential election day. On the petition are many names, the bearers of which are known to be in favor of the sale of liquor. The petition is a fairly representative one, and the court, under the law, must grant the request. The two precincts of Dairy and North Forest are sub-jointed in the petition.

THOMPSON—HOLLENBECK.

The bride was beautifully gowned in a White Organdy, and the groom in the conventional black. Mrs. Thompson is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Hollenbeck, well known in that section of the county, and is very popular with the young people of that vicinity. The groom is one of the well known firm of Thompson Brothers, the Mountindale sawmill firm, and is heavily interested in the vicinity of Mountindale.

They will make their home at Mountindale, and are receiving the well wishes of a large circle of friends.

Mrs. Perrin Northrup, a well known pioneer of this county, died at the home of her son, John Northrup, near Mountindale, the first of the week. Deceased's maiden name was Rachel Miller, and she was married to Mr. Northrup in 1857. The husband died in Wasco county, May 20, 1904. The following children survive: Mrs. Minnie Young, Portland; H. L. Northrup, Lake View, Ore., and J. I. Northrup, of Mountindale. Mrs. Northrup was a devoted member of the United Brethren church.

According to the complaint of Hulda Wilson, who asks for divorce, her husband, William, has made their home on Gales Creek a trouble joint wherein the microbe of gall and bitterness wriggled to its complete satisfaction. Mrs. Wilson alleges that her husband habitually abused her, cursed her, repeatedly called her a "clabber-head," an "idiot"—and a "damned one" at that—and has made life a burden to her. She swears that she helped milk fourteen cows on the place, from which they were sending milk to the condenser, and helped to do other work about the ranch that was in the province of hired labor, and when she was worn out he would abuse her for not being able to do more. She asks for one-third of his personal property and one-third of his real estate. Since filing her complaint, her attorney, Judge Hollis, has learned that Wilson has given a bill of sale of nearly all the personal property. According to her complaint she became so unbearable that she left him early in this month. She asks for the custody of two minor daughters.

Henry Bird, a youth of 11 years, and whose father is working in Eastern Oregon, was caught in the Frank Pauli residence yesterday afternoon, under the bed, by the owner of the house. The lad was pulled from his hiding place and his pockets were found full of trinkets that he had taken while in the house. The hearing of the lad will take place late this evening. Hillsboro has a large number of small lads from ten to sixteen years who are looking for the trouble house, and if parents do not do something toward curbing their waywardness many will find themselves at the Reform school before the year is over.

H. T. Bagley, who spent three days at the St. Louis Fair, says that the criticism of the Oregon exhibit is entirely uncalled for, and that it is attracting more attention than any of the Western displays. He unqualifiedly states that Hon. W. H. Wehrung is the right man in the right place and this opinion is readily accepted, since Oregon knows how Mr. Wehrung put the State Fair on its feet, and made it a credit to the State, and the best Fair held on Pacific Coast. H. T. says that W. G. Hare handles the Forestry and Game exhibit like an old hand at the business. Miss Alice Wehrung guided H. T. through the Pike, and successfully piloted him to all the points of interest.

The case of the state against Elijah Wilson, a Gales Creek lad in his teens, charged with assaulting Ben Parsons, was heard today in Judge Bagley's justice court by the following jury: Rufus Waggoner, James H. Sewell, T. R. Imbrie, R. H. Greer, F. M. Heide and J. A. Imbrie. The offense is alleged to have taken place on June 24th of this year. E. B. Tongue prosecuted and Geo. Bagley defended. About twenty witnesses were on hand from the Gales Creek section, and the case was contested with all the anxiety manifested with a supreme court matter. The jury is still out as we go to press.

Thos. Fowles was down from Mountindale yesterday, and reports that the new Union church on his place, two miles from Mountindale, is now ready for inclosing, the frame work being erected. When finished the people up in that section will have a church that will be used by Christians of all denominations.

Elder Pierce closed the big Free Methodist camp meeting at the Warren Grove, Sunday night, and left for Forest Grove, where another meeting will be commenced at once. It is reported that the revival here was a great success, both from the standpoints of finance and converts.

Attorney H. T. Bagley returned from an extended trip to the east, Sunday morning. While absent he visited at Canton, Ohio, St. Louis, where he saw the big Fair for three days, and then stopped at points in Kansas.
