

CONTRACTOR GOODIN SUCCESSFUL BIDDER

Gets The Award to Build Addition to Poor Farm.

ROCK CREEK BRIDGE ACCEPTED.

Commissioners' Court Held Adjourned Session Tuesday.

The County Board, Hon. L. A. Rood, Judge, and W. J. Butler, Beaverton, and C. B. Buchanan, commissioners, met in adjourned session, Tuesday, and took up the matter of improving the county poor farm building. There were but two bidders on the proposed addition, Contractor J. W. Goodin and D. B. Reasoner, submitting figures. Mr. Reasoner's bid was \$734.70, while Mr. Goodin's bid was \$728. The latter was awarded the contract, and will commence work as soon as the material can be delivered. The addition to the county poor house will embrace a room, story and a half, the lower part to be used as a dining room and kitchen, and there will be a porch added, and two small closets. The upstairs will not be finished, but later on may be cut up into rooms, if the inmates increase sufficiently to demand it.

The Rock Creek bridge was accepted, and a warrant was ordered drawn in favor of the builder, J. W. Goodin, for \$848, contract price and \$4.90, extra labor and material. County Clerk Godman was authorized to secure sufficient help to copy the 1904 tax roll.

The position of road supervisor for Dilley precinct, Road District No. 15, declared vacant, J. F. Uim having moved to Forest Grove; C. Hubbard was elected to fill vacancy. Union Trust & Investment Co. was notified that they must pay all taxes, costs, penalties and interest and delinquent redemption fee before county would give the deed on land sold at delinquent sale.

Andrew Heckmann, of the Bethany—P. O. Box section, sent in a fine jar of full grown, ripened figs, this week, and they have been preserved in a glass jar, and are on exhibition at the Pharmacy. They are as large as the ordinary Bartlett pears and have a luscious appearance. They were grown from a tree that was planted 45 years ago by Jacob Brugger, deceased, and the tree is several inches in diameter, with a foliage that could hardly be encompassed inside the bandstand that stands in the court house yard. Mr. Heckmann raises two crops off the tree, but the third will hardly ripen, as the rains come too early in the Fall. He will send them to St. Louis for exhibition as to what Oregon can do in this line, and the jar will find a place of honor in the Oregon exhibit. Johnson was arraigned this morning and given further time to plead. When before Justice Bagley, Johnson said there was nothing to the charge, and incoherently said something about the sun affecting Shattuck's head. Johnson is not exactly right in his own head, judging from his talk, and it is said that his father is in an insane asylum. Johnson's wife sent Shattuck over to swear to the warrant, as she stated she could not get away from the ranch, and that she feared for her life. Johnson is a little bit of a fellow and his wife is about 200 avoirdupois. The hearing will take place tomorrow at ten. Bonds were fixed at \$800.
