

VOICE AND VIOLIN

NOTED WOMAN ORATOR.

Rev. Anna H. Shaw, the New Head of the Woman Suffragists.

Rev. Anna H. Shaw of Philadelphia, who was recently elected president of the National American Woman Suffrage association, is one of the ablest and most eloquent platform speakers in the country.

A native of England, Anna Shaw was brought to this country when but five years of age and was reared in a backwoods region of Michigan which was destitute of schools and libraries. Her early education was gleaned from the walls of a log cabin which was papered with old copies of the New York Independent.

Despite her meager opportunities for mental development, the young pioneer educated herself sufficiently to enable her to begin teaching at the age of fifteen. While still in her early youth Miss Shaw displayed such decided ability as a public speaker that the district conference of her locality voted unanimously to grant her a preacher's license. Two years later she entered the theological department of the Boston university, from which she was graduated in 1878.

Leaving the university, Miss Shaw became pastor of a Methodist church

In Hingham, Mass., later going to East Dennis, where she spent seven years, during six of which she preached for both the Methodist and Congregational churches. During her pastorate at East Dennis Miss Shaw took a medical course at the Boston university, practicing among the poor while acquiring her education as a physician. She is a small, rather demure looking woman, with white hair, a fair complexion and expressive dark eyes. She has a well trained mind and boundless pluck and is devoted to the cause of women.

THE MIGHTY TORPEDO.

Prodigious Destructive Power of Modern War Engine.

The Whitehead automobile fish torpedo, which the Japanese have used with such terrible effect against the warships, is one of the most powerful engines of destruction employed in modern naval warfare.

The torpedo, or "baby," as it is called by the sailors, is shaped like a cigar and is from fourteen to eighteen feet long and from fourteen to eighteen inches in diameter at its thickest part, which is the head. It is made of steel or bronze and divided into several compartments. The explosive charge of gun cotton is placed in the foremost chamber, and protruding from the head is a rod of steel, the rear end of which is pointed and extends into the explosive. When the torpedo comes in contact with a solid body the rod is driven against a detonator, which explodes the charge.

Behind the first compartment is the air chamber, which supplies the motive

power for the engines that propel the torpedo after it is launched. These engines revolve a shaft on the end of which are two screw propellers. These drive the torpedo at a speed of over twenty knots an hour.

The torpedo is launched from the bow, stern or side of a vessel, either from a submerged tube or from a tube on deck. It is blown out by compressed air or a small charge of powder.

Special precautions have to be taken to prevent the torpedo from damaging the warship from which it is expelled. The firing rod is so arranged that it cannot go back until a small collar with propeller fans on it has been revolved off. When the torpedo enters the water the fans begin to turn, and when the "baby" has run about thirty yards the collar is worked off. Even then the charge will not explode unless the blow to the rod is severe enough to shear off a little copper pin standing in the way.
