

NEW BANKING FIRM IS INCORPORATED

Three Local Business Men
Are Included In Articles.

CAPITAL TWENTY FIVE THOUSAND

Ed Schulerich, Wm. Bagley Sr. and
Geo. Zeitman Invest in New Venture.

The Hillsboro Commercial Bank has filed articles of incorporation and the capital of the new banking house is \$25,000, paid up. The object as set forth in the articles is to buy and sell real estate, to do a general banking business, to borrow and loan money on real estate and personal property, etc. The incorporators are A. S. Sholes, C. S. Russell, late of Michigan, the former now a resident of Hillsboro, Wm. Bagley Sr., of Leisville, Ed. Schulerich, of Hillsboro, and Geo. Zeitman, of Leisville.

The new firm will occupy the new bank building just erected by Mr. Schulerich on Main Street, just east of and adjoining the Wehrung brick block, and as the structure is about completed, business will be commenced in a very short time. This is Hillsboro's second bank, the Shute bank being the only bank Hillsboro has had for years.

A THIRD RURAL ROUTE ORDERED

Will be Established Out of
Hillsboro, September 15

THROUGH CORNELIUS AND GLENCOE

Thirty-two Miles is Length of Service.

Third Out of Hillsboro

The postal department has ordered that a third rural delivery route be established out of Hillsboro, service to begin on September 15. The run will be daily, except Sunday, as follows: West past cemetery to Honzak's corner, west of long bridge; south half mile; retrace to Honzak's; then west to Cornelius; then north of Cornelius-Centerville road to corner of M. Wren donation; then east to Wm. Bagley's corner; south to Louis Powers; east to J. M. Gates; north past the Millen place and I. Leisy's to church; then west to Pranger's, on the old Blanchard place; north past Wm. Bagley place to corner of Burton donation; east to T. R. Davis' corner; north to Lepechatt's; east to J. W. Connell's place; north to Farham's; then to Jackson school house; north to C. O. White's place, the old Darcy ranch; west to Stans place; south through Shady Brook and Glencoe; back past Tamiesie place, past Lepechatt's, past Clem Shaver's, past Peterson's and Crow's, and into Hillsboro via the old Klinehamer brickyard. The route embraces a service of 32 miles, and will accommodate a vast number of patrons.
