Mercury stood 100 in San Francisco, yesterday.

The democrats suffered a worse defeat at the polls in Vermont than for years.

The Columbia river salmon pack is said to be 40,000 cases larger than last year.

Eight dead and fifty wounded is the result of a train going over an embankment near Moberly, Mo., on the Wabash, Tuesday.

Eighty five per cent. of the Arkansas vote went to the democrats—the usual proportion.

Fred VanNorden, a jeweler at The Dalles, lost \$300 worth of gold watches last night.

Bakersfield, Cal., lost three blocks by fire yesterday and the loss is estimated at a quarter million.

Agent Westerdahl, of the Union Pacific, says that the low rates will bring many eastern farmers to Oregon to locate this winter.

The big packing house strike, affecting several of the big Mississippi valley cities, will be continued, the men having voted against settling.

Red spiders are said to be damaging the hop crop up the valley. There is none in evidence in Washington county.

A robber entered the Overland hotel at Weiser, Idaho, and held up the bartender, but overlooked \$2,000, in the safe, the safe being unlocked.

Geo. W. Rauth, a young gambler of Oregon City, shot and fatally wounded Mrs. Lenore Jones, because of jealousy, the last of the week.

Kuropatkin has withdrawn all his army at Mukden and is getting ready to make another retreat, if necessary. The Argus can't back Kuro much longer unless he begins to show that he has a backbone.

Burgess, the famous French swimmer, failed to swim the English channel, and was picked up when within two miles of the French coast. He made a great speed record. A local Hillsboro swimmer whose first name is H. T. Bagley came nearer than that to swimming across Dairy Creek, one day this summer.
