Will Repeat Tomorrow Night

Local Talent Under Direction of Martin E. Robinson, who Goes to the Marquand

The beautiful Scriptural cantata "Queen Esther," was presented by local talent this evening in the opera house to a large audience. Miss Lura Waggoner, as Queen Esther, made a regal appearance, and her solo work was splendid. W. J. Wall as Mordecai, the uncle of Esther, was all that could be desired, and the work of Fred Vrooman, as Haman, and Miss Stella Boscow, as Zerah, having some of the most difficult and striking solo and duet work, was given a very hearty applause. Chas. Lamkin, as king, carried his part with dignity and dignity and his voice was in good form. Miss Jennie Greer, as Mordecai's sister, gave her numbers in her usual splendid manner, and Miss Eulalia Hoyt, in the first act, did work that was very dramatic, where she denounces Haman in the presence of the King. John M. Brown, Hillsboro's annual Uncle Sam, made a patriarchal High Priest, and Gilbert Tilbury, as Hegai and the Beggar, showed to good advantage in both. The Muses Arab Hoyt and Lucy Humphreys, as the Median and Persian princesses, did admirably, and H. A. Hineshaw, as Seribe, gave excellent tenor work. L. M. Hoyt, as captain of the guards, had charge of the floor work, and his direction was more than creditable.

Mrs. J. M. Brown, Rose Bowser, Stella Tilbury and Irene Young, had a double duet in the third act, and their rendition was fine and acting beautiful. The cymbal drill by the pages, Grace Ballard and Grace Bath, by the Sabin and Mabel Gilbert, was given hearty approval. The scarf drill by the King's Maidens, the Misses Anna Chalmers, Eva Weathered, Grace Robinson, Paye Corwin, Maude Wilson, Jennie Tilbury and Bertha Patterson was endorsed, and is the prettiest bit of spectacular work seen here for years. Little Bessie Connell, as Haman's child, at the parting of Haman and his wife, was particularly effective, and the audience appreciated the little one's rendition beyond measure.

As a matter of fact the chorus singing was the finest ever heard here, every voice doing excellent work, and the cantata will long be remembered as the best thing of its kind ever heard by the Hillsboro public. Jennie Thorne, as accompanist, was excellent.

The costumes were brilliant and spectacular, and the grouping, under direction of Mr. Robinson, was excellent. Considering the short time that Mr. Robinson has had to get the singers into shape he has done remarkably well.

The cantata will again be given this Friday evening, and there is promise of an attendance that will fill the house.
