

STATE OF OREGON SUES THE COUNTY

Wants What is due State, but
Refuses to pay County

COUNTY WANTS ITS MONEY BACK

District Attorney Allen and Attorney
General Crawford Argue

(Circuit Court—Cont'd from Page 1.)
A fine point of law was argued yesterday in the case of the State against Washington county, where in the latter is sued for \$142 11, interests on the scalp bounty tax. The county was late in paying this claim, and the state sued for interest. The county denies interest liability, but wishes to offset \$132, with interest, against the state claim, upon certificates issued the county, by the state, for bounty paid out by the defendant, under

the provisions of the law. The scalp bounty law instructed the secretary of state to draw warrants to each county in the sum of two-thirds of the sums paid out for scalp bounty. The fund was exhausted, and when the secretary drew his certificates there was no money to pay them. The state now wants interest, but as the last legislature failed and refused to pass an appropriation to pay these claims, the Attorney General, A. M. Crawford, who was in court yesterday, denies the liability.

District Attorney Allen contends that these certificates are conclusive evidence of debt due the county from the state; that the law authorized the secretary of state to issue them; that there is a law approved February 27, 1901, warranting the action of that official and that under the circumstances the county has a valid obligation and offset against the state's claim. Mr. Allen contended that the law was a contract with the counties; and that when the county did its part the state was not to be allowed to repudiate its just debt—and a debt that the law created, and a debt founded upon the fact that the state was following the very law that the state now refuses to recognize. He claimed that when the state came into court it stood just as an individual, and therefore the claim must be considered an offset.

Messrs. Crawford and Allen will file briefs with Judge McBride within the next thirty days, touching upon this question.

Oakman was brought into court this morning at 11:00, and pleaded not guilty to the charge of murdering Frank Bennett on the evening of August 27. Attorney S. B. Huston asked for time to procure affi-

davits on depositions from Oakman's home in Illinois, touching upon his previous good reputation. The court then set the date of trial on December 15.

Chesbro vs Chesbro, divorce granted, and fees of plaintiff to court, remitted; ordered that when defendant visited children that he must pay \$5 for their support, each and every time such visit is made.

Wm. Hays pleaded guilty to assaulting Goldfeldt, the Sherwood saloon keeper, and Judge McBride this afternoon sentenced him to six months in the penitentiary, this being the minimum sentence. The Judge stated that because of his youth, and the further fact that he had served in the Philippines, he would be lenient for this time. This was for the assault with the knife, the hatchet case being dismissed.

Sheriff Connell left with Wm.

Hays, this evening, the defendant to serve six months in the "pen." This is one case, as Judge McBride remarked, not judicially, where the "pen" is mightier than the butcher knife.

O. Chowning was indicted for selling liquor in quantities less than one gallon and he was arraigned this afternoon. His bond was fixed at \$200 and he was given until tomorrow morning to plead.

YAMHILL COURT SAVES HIM TROUBLE

Says Oregon's Exhibit at St. Louis, on
Horticulture, Beats Them all

Judge William Galloway, circuit judge of Linn, Marion, Yamhill, Polk and Tillamook counties, was a visitor at Judge McBride's court yesterday, and incidentally greeted old pioneer friends. Judge Galloway says that the Yamhill County court, by not issuing an election certificate on the prohibition vote saves him a great deal of trouble, and the matter is settled without circuit court adjudication.

He states that the worst case he has in his circuit are the hop contracts. Rarely is one of the hop contracts a mutual interest bargain, and the Supreme Court has decided that the one sided contracts are valid, and the lower court can not set aside the decree of the higher court.

Judge Galloway's son, C. V. of McMinnville, is in charge of Oregon's Horticultural exhibit at St. Louis, and the Judge states that since September the Oregon fruit display is the finest at the Fair Pears and apples, and prunes as well, beat anything there, and a prominent Washington State fruit grower who just returned from St. Louis stated to Mr. Galloway yesterday morning that Oregon, on the finish, had the finest exhibit in all the Fair, even if it did come late.

Recorder Bagley is making his report of the city's finances for the year, and will have it ready by next Tuesday evening. So far as completed, the report shows that from March 1 to October 1 the total receipt from the water and light plant were \$4,886.68, with \$126 41 yet delinquent, all of which is good, making a total to the credit of the plant of \$5,000 for the eight months set out. Interest to the extent of \$1225 has been paid on the water and light bonds, and \$8776.81 has been expended on the plant for labor, salary, supplies, expense of operating, expediting, and plant improvement, making a total disbursement of \$9991.81 for the period. Of this amount the sum of \$2321.91 has been expended for improving the plant, such as new boiler and engine and other necessary repairs, leaving the plant in fine condition. The expenditures of the general fund are \$1386.68 of which \$719.92 is for warrants drawn in favor of the water and light plant for lights and hydrant service.

Persons sending fruit to the National Grange exhibit at Portland may have their jars by calling on W. J. Wall, of this city, or apprise him how he shall send them. Mr. Wall states that the Washington county exhibit was better than Clackamas, or equally as good, with the exception of the potatoes exhibit. Clackamas had one potato that weighed 2 pounds and 5 ounces, and it was on this showing that Clackamas was given first prize at ten o'clock in the morning. By 12, however, Washington was reinforced by a potato from J. T. Killen, of Greenville, which weighed 2 pounds, 14 ounces. That one "spud" might have won.

John Dennis' big dog had an experience that he will remember for some time, the other night, when he strayed into the Palmist building, under construction, and fell into a twenty foot well, and remained until after daylight. There was about four feet of water in the well, but his dogship managed to keep his nose above water. He was pulled out and made a hurried trip home and since then he can't be induced to even go out on the porch when it is sprinkling.
