

ASKS FOUR THOUSAND DOLLARS FROM JETER

W. A. Spence, of Gaston, asks Big Damages

ALLEGES HE WAS BADLY DECEIVED

Jeter and Purdy Declared There Was No Fraud in Deal

The case of W. A. Spence vs. E. H. Jeter occupied three days this week. Mr. Spence contends that Mr. Jeter sold him stock in the Gaston Milling Company, by misrepresenting the assets of the mill, and asked for \$4,400 damages, the value of the stock the Company having taken Mr. Spence's farm in the trade. Mr. Jeter alleged that there was no misrepresentation. Geo. R. Bagley and W. D. Hare appeared for Spence and S. B. Huston for Mr. Jeter. The jury in the case; J. W. Hays, M. E. Dilley, Fred Reed, Jacob Lohr, G. W. Stitt, Arthur Cuttings, O. M. Galloway, B. R. Patten, Dan Burkhalter, John H. Grabel, G. A. Plieth and Geo. Kirkwood. The case was argued this afternoon.

The case of appeal of J. W. Harttrampf, from justice court, against Mrs. Nixon, of Forest Grove, is on trial now. Mrs. Nixon originally sued Mr. Harttrampf before Justice Wirtz, of Forest Grove, for a real estate commission, amounting to \$50, claiming that she was the agency that made the sale. Harttrampf denied this, and the first time the jury disagreed, with a majority, it is said, in favor of defendant, Harttrampf. Upon the case being tried again the jury gave Mrs. Nixon a verdict, and Mr. Harttrampf appealed to the circuit court. He contends that she did not make the sale, but that M. L. Noble was responsible for the deal. The jury as selected is: E. J. Ward, Geo. A. Morgan, Henry Howe, A. J. Roy, J. W. Sewell, E. P. Cornelius, Thos. Emerick, G. N. Hale, M. E. Hotchkiss, Wm. Schulmerich, Wm. Batheholder and J. H. Grabel. Hoffman and Welch defend the case for Mrs. Nixon and Geo. R. and H. T. Bagley are counsel for Mr. Harttrampf.

Michael Kelly, the well known old horseman and race track follower for years, and who for twenty years was a resident of this city, died yesterday at the Catholic Home for the Aged, in Portland. The boys around town made up a purse, which was swelled by an appropriation from the county commissioners and a check was sent down to give the old gentleman a decent burial. Kelly was a man of peculiar characteristics, and on a point of honor he was invincible. He was a native of Ireland, and came to America when he was a boy, stopping first at Canton, Ohio. For many years he has been a follower of the races in the northwest and he is well known to many prominent horsemen. He has the past few years abstained from drinking, and always made a few dollars in trading for a horse, or buying one, fitting it up, and then selling it. Twenty years ago he was a whole cyclone in himself, and ill-betide the man who went up against him for a weekling. May peace rest with his soul. He was an ardent Catholic in religion—and a frequent remark of his was, "Sure, I'll never go back on the religion of my mother."

Thos. Cornelius, well known here in Washington county, and who is a son of the late Col. T. R. Cornelius, was elected marshal of Salem, Monday, by a margin of eight votes. Eight votes is as good for all practical purposes as eight hundred, and The Argus predicts that T. E. will make a good official. There is some talk of contesting Mr. Cornelius' election, as the city charter makes a three years' residence necessary to holding office, and in the 1902 election, in this county, Mr. Cornelius voted in the Cornelius precinct, Washington county. The contest is most likely all balderdash, however, and it is not likely will mature.

Washington county will be well represented on the program of the Thirtieth Annual meeting of the Oregon Dairymen's Association, to be held in Portland, December 20 and 21, in the Odd Fellows' Hall, corner First and Alder Streets. Wm. Schulmerich, of Farmington, the president of the association for the past two years, will respond to the address of welcome delivered by Mayor Williams; Dr. James Withycombe, of Corvallis, and formerly of South Tualatin, will speak on "Dairy Food Problems," and Dr. J. P. Tamiesie, of Hillsboro, will deliver an address "Variations of Total Milk Solids."

Commissioners' Court is in session this week and the board has audited the claims of judges and clerk of elections, allowing them \$3 for one day's work, instead of \$6, as the majority of the bills were filed. This will make a difference of \$315 in favor of the county. The board claims that the count was easily finished an hour or so after supper, in nearly all of the precincts, and that \$3 is a good wage for the day. Over 250 claims are filed with the court, and it is out of the question to publish them this week, as court does not adjourn until tomorrow, or late this evening, to say the least.

Isaac Bales Sr., who lived at Mountaineer's years ago, left Saturday evening for Ephrata, Wash., Douglas county, in a response to a telegram stating that his son, Isaac Bales Jr., had accidentally shot himself on November 24, and died shortly afterward. The dead man's wife died about a year ago and one child survives. The father left on the Great Northern for Ephrata, via Seattle, and will go on to the Methow. He has been visiting here and in the valley for over a year.

Mr. Skipton, who was beaten by 8 votes for the Salem marshaling, by Thos. Cornelius, formerly of this county, is in the city this evening. Mr. Skipton has retained L. K. Adams, formerly of this city, to litigate his case upon the grounds that Cornelius was two years ago a resident of this county and the Salem city charter makes a three years' residence necessary to hold an office.

Thos. S. Wilkes, ex-county surveyor, and well known to nearly all Washington county people, is at present connected with the United States Surveyor General's office at Phoenix, Arizona. Thos. likes the Arizona climate, and says that thousands come there every year to seek relief from tuberculosis. The open air life there is of much benefit to sufferers of that malady.

A DENVER BANKER WINS A LAWSUIT

John A. Edy, of Middleton, Must Pay Note

ALL OVER LIFE INSURANCE POLICY

Case of Wm. A. Spence Versus E. H. Jeter, Tried in Circuit Court

Monday in circuit court was taken up with trying the case of a Denver bank against John A. Edy, of Middleton. Mr. Edy was formerly a stockman of Colorado, and he had borrowed \$3750 from the bank, giving a chattel mortgage on a lot of livestock. Mr. Edy took out a life insurance policy for \$3000, and gave his note to the bank for the amount of the premium, and his defense was that the amount of the policy, in case of death, was not payable to his wife, as he supposed, but to the bank, and the deposition of the bank alleged that when he made the big loan it was agreed that he should take out the insurance, and the policy was deposited with them, and made payable to the bank, as additional security on the big loan. The jury, consisting of M. E. Hotchkiss, Jacob Lohr, A. J. Roy, J. W. Copeland, John H. Grabel, G. W. Stitt, Jos. Hays, Dan Burkhalter, G. A. Plieth, O. M. Galloway, G. N. Hale and Geo. Kirkwood, found for the plaintiff in the sum of \$187.38. The banker's deposition gave Mr. Edy a very good reputation, saying "that Mr. Edy was a very peculiar man, and if he were convinced that he was in error he would not doubt pay the money into court at once." Geo. R. Bagley was counsel for plaintiff, and John M. Wall appeared for the defense.

TROUBLE IN THE FAMILY

Mrs. Annie Reb, of near Centerville, has brought suit in the circuit court to recover \$300, which she alleges now is in the hands of her husband, Frank Reb. The plaintiff asks for a decree returning to her the money, and \$100 damages. Her statement to her attorney, John M. Wall, is that the couple came here from Kansas several months ago, and some money was sent her, several hundred dollars, from home, and that inadvertently it was sent in the husband's name, while it belonged to her. She says the husband banked the amount and has been drawing on the account ever since, and is dissipating it. She has proceeded to get out attachment proceedings, and if the husband fights it the affair will be settled in the courts.

Meet to Confer Over Legislative Matters

WILL MAKE A UNITED FRONT

The Washington County legislative delegation consisting of Hon. E. W. Haines, state senator, of Forest Grove; Hon. A. B. Flint, of Kinton; Hon. W. K. Newell, Dilley and Hon. M. S. Barnes, of Beaverton, the three members of the lower house of the legislature, met in this city yesterday and held a conference in order to present an organized effort for legislation touching Washington county and its interests.

The delegation will act as a unit in getting such laws as the people of the county may ask, and they state that they will carry any charter amendments for Hillsboro and Forest Grove that are asked for by anything like a decent majority of the people.
