Delinquent Tax, 1903

By virtue of a warrant issued by the County Clerk and ex-officio Clerk of the County Court of the State of Oregon to the County Sheriff, commanding me to sell the several tracts or parcels of real property embraced in the delinquent tax list for the year 1903 in the manner and to the effect of real property on execution.

WILL SUPPORT PRESIDENT

The democrats in congress have voted solemnly to sustain the president's appeal for legislation that will curb the railways. This is eminently proper, and it is an earnest of a better era in public affairs. The republicans are so divided on the question of any legislation that involves the vested rights of corporations, that it is doubtful if any law of this nature could pass without democratic support.

Now if the president will instruct his attorney general to enforce the criminal clause of the Sherman law, and democrats and republicans will give him support, we shall ascertain whether the people or corporations shall run the country.

The Missouri legislature is dead locked on the election of United States senator, and the St. Louis candidate who succeeded in getting a brewer to put up \$20,000, and who is a caucus nominee, has failed of election. Missouri republicans have the legislature, and they seem powerless to use it. The most sensible thing they could do, and this would be in line with what Missouri really wants, would be to re-elect Cookrell, for he is an honor to the state and a credit to his constituency, and that is more than can be said of the leading republican candidate.

From far and near the Argus hears the road proposition of J. W. Shute, endorsed as the only practical way to get immediate results—and that is what is wanted. The only complaint is that the 8 foot bed is rather limited, but this objection could easily be overcome by making it ten or twelve feet in width. If Mr. Shute's idea were adopted Washington county could have forty or fifty miles of good roads built each year, and the cost of rock, after, would not be over a third as expensive as to originally put on rock.

The constitutional convention bill failed of passage, and it will be two years until the affair is again broached, unless we shall have a special session. This, with a senatorial fight coming on, should make the next legislative meeting one of interest.
