

FOREST GROVE GIVES A SALOON LICENSE

Pacific University Officials
Will Contest

STAR BREWERY BACKS PROJECT

Mayor Johnson Casts Decisive vote
For License

Forest Grove, Or., Feb. 15.—With the new City Council of Forest Grove deadlocked over the question of granting the first saloon license Forest Grove has ever had, Mayor C. N. Johnson cast the deciding vote last night in favor of a license. The action precipitates the long-threatened fight with the authorities of Pacific University and Tualatin Academy, who have declared they would never permit a saloon within the boundaries of the city. The site for the proposed liquor shop, which will be started as soon as a building can be constructed, is on the main street, near the P. O. office, and less than 400 feet west of the college building. The license was granted to Albert G. Watson.

A peculiar phase of the situation is that the lot on which it is proposed to erect the saloon building is a part of the old Ekanah-Walker donation land claim, and one of the few sites not originally held by the officials of Tualatin Academy and Pacific University. Laid down from the Ekanah-Walker donation claim, however, contained a reversionary clause, providing that the land should revert to the heirs if "intoxicating liquors" were ever sold on the premises. This apparently made Ekanah-Walker donation claim lands even less adapted for saloon purposes than lands for college holding, in which the reversionary clause provided that "ardent spirits" should not be sold, thus not including beer, which would be restricted under the clause "intoxicating liquors."

Sometimes in the '60s, however, the particular lot on which it is proposed to locate the saloon was sold to A. T. Smith, to whom was given a quitclaim deed by the preceding holder which inadvertently left out the reversionary clause. Some think this omission would invalidate the original claim, but legal advice in Portland states that it will not.

President W. N. Ferrin was asked by The Telegram correspondent this morning what action the college would take in view of the granting of the license. He said: "I would not care to discuss in advance the action of her trustees, should the saloon be established in Forest Grove. Indeed, I may say our course of action has not been entirely settled. If the saloon element were to put a saloon on property once owned by the college, then we should know what to do. But it is rumored that they will secure a vacant lot which is not covered by a college deed. In this event I am not at liberty to state what we intend to do."

The lot on which the proposed saloon will be built is owned by C. F. Miller, druggist, and was purchased from a Mr. Fuqua. The Council vote stood: For license, Cornelius, Laughlin and McNamara; against, Hollinger, Starrett and Harris. The Star Brewery, of Portland, and Mr. Van Schuyver, of Portland, went on Watson's \$1000 bond.—Telegram.

A CORRECTION
