Kansas is getting after the Standard Oil. When Kansas gets after its Congressmen and Senators who stand with the big interests it will be entitled to admiration.

Every citizen who wishes to continue the present state of affairs should refuse to sign the petition for a referendum of the general appropriation bill, for if the bill is not referred, it will be an invitation for the next legislature to pile up expenses a little higher. Every citizen who wishes to give the law-making body a severe jolting should sign the bill, and teach lawmakers that they can not indiscriminately tax the people, regardless of public sentiment.

Thos. Richardson, of the Oregon Development League, called the state convention off because the railways would not give a one fare for the round trip. The roads offered a one and one-third rate, but Richardson held that this was altogether too expensive for those who were elected to come from Eastern and Southern Oregon. So the boys who were billed to get together to help build up the various interests of the state at their own expense will remain at home for the present. As a matter of fact the charge for Washington County would not amount to much, but where delegates must ride several hundred miles it would make quite a difference to their expense accounts. Right at this time a convention would have meant a great deal to the state, and it is deplorable that the railroads and Mr. Richardson could not get together.

The United States Senate is keeping up its record as a barnacle to the progress of the country, and it needs no analysis to disclose the cause. The fact that senators are not elected by the vote of the people is everything. Senators in half the states are sent to Washington because they buy their way into office. Can any sane constituency expect that such men will go to Washington and work for the best interests of the republic? Can you expect men like Dewey, who is president of a railway, and Aldrich, who stands as attorney for the manufacturing interests, to vote for legislation that will aid the farmer or the consumer? Just as well expect perpetual motion! What this country wants is little more purity in the way of election of senators—and then we can get better law-making.
