NO SALOON AT FOREST GROVE

"license, tax and regulate" auctioneers, taverns, drays, hacks, wagons, hawkers, peddlers, brokers, pawn-brokers, money changers, travelling salesmen, solicitors and all business houses and branches of business not otherwise provided for.

It is claimed on demurrer that the power to regulate includes the power to license, and that even were this not so, that the power given in section 8 to license all branches of business applies to the liquor business and that there is abundant power granted in said section 8 to authorize the license ordinance.

I do not believe that section 8 confers the power to license a saloon—it applies in terms only to such "business houses or branches of business as are not otherwise provided for," and I think the liquor business was otherwise provided for in section 7, immediately preceding, and that unless the power to "supervise, regulate and prohibit," given in section 7 necessarily, or by implication, grants the power to license, such power does not exist.

Now, does the power to regulate include the power to license? Decisions are not waiting on either side of this question, although estimated numerically the weight of authority seems to be that under particular circumstances the authority to regulate may imply the authority to license.

But if all turns on the intent of the legislature, and if the intent is doubtful, the power will be denied.

In determining the legislative intent the court will take into consideration

of legislation, the general history of legislation on the same subject and the local history of the country—and each of these has been referred to in the argument of this case. It is alleged in the complaint that Forest Grove has never had a saloon. It is a part of the history of the county that for more than fifty years one of the best educational institutions of the country has been maintained there—an institution whose students have been leaders in public thought, reflecting alike the worth of the institution and credit upon it.

It was organized as a temperance town; its very soil was dedicated to temperance by a provision in the early conveyances of its founders that no spirituous liquors should be sold on any tract in the town.

In 1885 the present provision was placed in the charter—in 1893 a new charter was adopted and the present provision retained. The charter of 1893 shows on its face that it was approved by the council before it was submitted to the legislature, and nobody who knows the history of Forest Grove in 1893 will for a moment believe that the council intentionally prepared and submitted to the legislature a charter that permitted the licensing of the liquor traffic—if it is so implied in the charter it must have escaped their attention. The legislature at the session of 1895 passed more than 30 bills relating to city charters and wherever they dealt with the liquor question the words used are "To license, tax, regulate, restrain or prohibit," or some equivalent language—always the word "license," except with the charter of Forest Grove. If it were the intent of the legislature to permit Forest Grove to license the sale of liquor, why use the word "license" in every other charter bill passed at that session and leave it out of Forest Grove's charter?

The omission is significant and in itself is almost sufficient to generate that the authorities say should be resolved against the power.

Again, why in section 6, of the same sub-division of the charter, is the word "license" used in regard to billiard tables and bowling alleys, and omitted when the liquor question was dealt with in section 7, the very next section? This is another significant omission. Is it possible that the word "license" was necessary to authorize the council to license a billiard hall, but that the word "regulate" was sufficient to authorize it to license a saloon? I can not so conclude.

Again, why in section 8, immediately following, does the legislature authorize the council to license all other business houses and branches of business and remain oblivious to the necessity of using the word "license" in respect to the method of dealing with the liquor question, if it intended that the power to license the traffic in intoxicating liquor should be granted? Taking the charter by its four corners and seeking in its contents as a whole for light upon this question I can not read the word "license" into it. The legislature did not put it there; the city council which caused this charter to be presented and wrote their approvals of its provisions upon its face did not put it there—and the court will not put it there.

I am satisfied that the legislature no more intended that the City Council should license the selling of liquor than it should license a bawdy house or a gambling hall. In passing upon this question the court does not consider what would be best for the citizens of Forest Grove. It is possible that the liquor traffic would be less dangerous to public morals if conducted as required in the proposed ordinance, than it would be if conducted secretly and unlawfully, but if that is true they have only to go to the legislature and secure the authority which in my opinion is lacking in the present charter. The ordinance set forth in the complaint is wholly void for want of authority in the City Council to pass it, and the demurrer will be overruled.

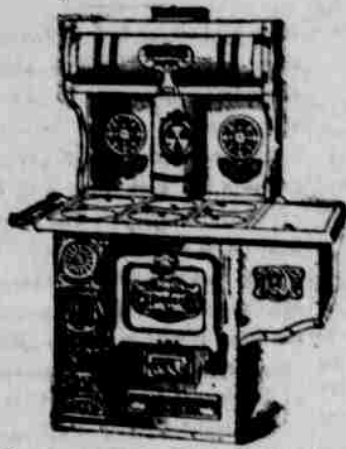
