HOPS ON THE RAISE

The hop market is slightly better this week, owing to the English demand, and choice are now bringing 25 cents in the local market. There are no sales, however, to speak of, the growers all feeling that English conditions are such that better prices must prevail. To show what the English situation is, the following is quoted from a hop paper across the pond:

HOP CONDITIONS IN ENGLAND

(Kentish Observer, Mar. 16.) There was a slight improvement in the demand from brewers toward the close of the week, but the inquiry has again fallen off, and business can only be effected at such low prices as 1/6 to 1/6 1/2 per cwt. These are, however, comparatively few parcels on offer and holders are very firm as a rule. The formation of the Hop Planter's Syndicate has now been completed, and it is understood that about 60 per cent of the unsold hops are in the pool.

Messrs. W. H. and H. LeMay, hop factors, London, report:—There is a very general demand for all descriptions of hops at hardening rates. Consumers, with six months' consumption in front of them, before another crop can be raised, are becoming anxious to secure sufficient to cover their requirements. The scarcity of stocks points to the probability that many will have serious difficulty in finding what they require. The foreign markets are advancing. The imports of hops into England from January 1st to February 28th, 1905, were 48,974 cwt. From the corresponding period last year 75,645 cwt. The exports of foreign hops from England from January 1st to February 28th, 1905, were 1,748 cwt. For the corresponding period last year 1,344 cwt.
