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EARLY PIONEERS HAVE A GOLDEN WEDDING

William R. Barrett and Wife Married 50 Years

CROSSED THE ISTHMUS TOGETHER

William R. Barrett and wife, Eliza J. Purdin Barrett celebrated their Golden Wedding at their home on Second Street, April 11, 1905, the children having planned a surprise for the elderly people.

After their marriage they located on a donation land claim, where they resided for some years, and Mr. Barrett in those times worked at the carpenter trade.

Their children are well known to the people of Washington County: Hon. W. N. Barrett, Hillsboro, ex-District Attorney for two terms in this judicial district, and once a member of the House of Representatives; Oregon legislature; Mrs. Alice Dooley, of Greenville, wife of Geo. Dooley; Amanda Purdin, wife of Hugh Purdin, Hillsboro; Mrs. Anna Parrish, wife of a Wilbur Wash, merchant; Miss Deborah Barrett, Hillsboro; and Chas. Barrett, of Greenville.

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Attorney S. B. Huston has been employed to defend Messrs. Jones and Thad. S. Potter, in the land fraud trials now before Judge Bellenger, and goes to Portland in the morning to commence his labors.

Mr. Huston states that he is inclined to believe that Judge Bennett, counsel for Senator Mitchell, will win his argument in the plea in abatement, as there are several of the grand jurors who were not on the tax roll.

One of them, Joe Essner, from Mountandale, is said to not be on the tax roll. District Attorney Heney can call another grand jury and have new indictments made, however.

An investigation of the tax roll shows that Joe Essner was on last year's tax roll, and that he paid taxes on land owned and he decided to his mother. On this year's roll, however, the property is assessed to Essner's mother, as well as the personal property belongs in the main, to Joseph Essner.

The county board has just received a road roller, of solid iron, practically weighing seven tons. The machine cost five cents per pound at the factory, making the cost \$700, with freight added.

The machine is eight feet in width and it will take six horses to operate it. It will be used on roads after they are graded, and on rock roads after the crushed rock has been put in place.

At the depot the other day when it was unloaded, some asked if it were a "steam roller." Ed. Moore proceeded to get waggish and said, "Yes, horse-tam roller." The "massheen" will be used in its initial work on the road between this city and Forest Grove.

The South Tualatin school, Miss Elsie Haffstater, teacher, gave a very nice entertainment last Saturday evening. Baskets were sold, and a fund of \$25.80 was collected for the purpose of purchasing a flag for the school building.

South Tualatin is now holding debates every Wednesday night, and they say that even the little children are debating out there. That neighborhood has some good oratorical ability, and some it might as well be utilized when the campaign comes again.

Sarah E. Stewart, formerly of this city, and who divorced Lucas Stewart some years ago, has attached the wages of the husband in the Multnomah County circuit court. Under the terms of the divorce Stewart was to have paid the wife \$10 per month, and she alleges that he has failed to do this for some time.

She attached his wages, the first of the week, effecting the garnishment of the Standard Box Factory, where Stewart is employed. They were married here in 1891.
