

ONE OF THE FREAKS OF THE LEGISLATURE

Law Which Makes County Build a Farmer's Fence

SINECURE FOR JUDGE AND SHERIFF

Provides for County Making Fence at
as Cost to Farmer

One of the freak laws of the last legislature provides that if a farmer has a wire fence that is in bad condition, and dangerous to animals or human beings, the sheriff must notify him, and if he does not make the necessary repair in ten days, the county court shall order the supervisor to cut off loose wire and repair the fence so that it will no longer be dangerous.

The statute makes no one liable for the expense, but says the court can sell the old wire upon execution, and pay the claims the same as all other county claims. Under the law if a man had a poor fence the court would have to repair it and the farmer would not be out any expense.

The silliness of the law was noted by Geo. E. Bagley, the other day, while reading the statutes passed by the recent law making body.

Here is a chance for Judge Rood and Sheriff Connell to get in their work as "official fence builders."

PRESBYTERY MEETS AT TUALATIN PLAINS

About 45 Ministers and El- ders Attend Meeting

ADJOURNED YESTERDAY EVENING

All Report a Very Profitable Session.
Thompson, Moderator

The Portland Presbytery met at the Tualatin Plains Presbyterian Church Tuesday evening, with an attendance of about 45 ministers and elders. After the opening sermon by the retiring Moderator, Rev. W. C. Laube, of Bethany, the assembly was constituted by prayer. Rev. D. E. Thompson, of the Sellwood church, was elected moderator. After roll call, and announcements by Rev. A. Robinson, adjournment was made until Wednesday morning. Mr. A. S. Patullo, elder of the First Pres. Church, Portland, opened the morning session with devotional exercises, after which the Presbytery was formally opened and the roll called. Sessional records were inspected and reports submitted.

The Home Mission Committee released Rev. A. Robinson from the Forest Dale and Buxton churches by dividing the county field, thus giving the Tualatin Plains Church every Sabbath Day, provided the necessary amounts can be raised, which is practically assured, as this church has had an excellent growth the past few years.

The ladies of the church served a sumptuous lunch at noon, in the new building, and speeches were made at table by Dr. E. P. Hill, Rev. W. S. Gilbert and others, expressing their high appreciation of the hospitality extended by the Tualatin Plains church people. Resolutions to this effect were read and passed at the table, after which was sung "Blest Be the Tie That Binds Our Hearts in Christian Love."
