TAX COLLECTION IS A BOOMER

Over One Hundred and Thirty Thousand

YET TWENTY THOUSAND UNPAID

Much of This Will be Paid in This Fall, on Half Payment

Sheriff J. W. Connell and his deputies have already collected in round numbers the magnificent sum of \$130,000, leaving a balance unpaid of about twenty thousand. Of this sum a great portion will be paid in on the half payment plan, before the first Monday in October. The Sheriff keeps sending out a stream of postals to those who have paid nothing, and they will have no excuse for a delinquent sale this December, when the tax collector will make his sale of all property on which taxes remain still unpaid.

Sheriff Connell is making a book of addresses for every tax payer, and this will be a great convenience in getting word from delinquents. After May 18 a man's postoffice address must be kept on the stub of the receipt kept in the office.

The franchise being secured, if the promoters mean business, it should now be but a matter of a few weeks until active construction follows, and the cars should be running into Hillsboro by September 1 at the latest.
