The county treasurer of Klamath County has sent out circular letters to all treasurers and sheriffs, asking their opinion as to changing the law so that the county treasurers will collect taxes, instead of the sheriffs. If he finds a majority of the officials will favor the idea a bill will be introduced in the next legislature to that effect.

The little two and one-half year old son of Mr. and Mrs. John Schneider, of near Phillips, while playing with a pea, Wednesday, pushed it up into the nose, and remained overnight with the obstacle in the channel. Repeated attempts by his parents to remove it only sent it further into the interior, and this afternoon they brought the little lad into Dr. F. A. Bailey, who removed it with the forceps.

The G. A. R. and the fraternal orders of Cornelius have arranged jointly this year to have a more elaborate memorial and decorative exercises at the Cornelius cemetery, on May 30, Decoration Day, at 2:00 p. m., and good speakers and music have been secured for the occasion. The Forest Grove band will be in attendance. The Cornelius W. O. W. and Circle, in uniform, will give the ritualistic work. The different orders will meet at their halls and march in a body to the cemetery. A grove has been cleared at the cemetery, so a place will be reserved for the exercises. The weather is warm.

Judge L. A. Rood is busy these days making specifications for the Jackson Bottom bridge, across the Tualatin river, bottom, south of Hillsboro. The plans call for two piling bridges, the end next to this city to be 3104 feet long, and with 300 feet of fill; a bridge 896 feet long south of the bridge now across the Tualatin, with a fill of about 200 feet in length. There are to be 195 bents of piling on the north bridge, three piling to the bent, and the piling are to be of cedar, or red or yellow fir, bids to be received on both kinds. The bents are to be 10 feet apart, and there will be seven stringers under the floor, each stringer to be 4x12x16, or a larger multiple, as regards to length. The floor is to be of plank 3x12x16, except each eighth plank, which is to be 20 feet long. The south bridge, connecting with the Tualatin bridge, will have 56 bents, built the same as the northern portion. Altogether, there will be 4500 feet of bridge and fill, or 4000 feet of bridge and 500 feet of filling. The contractor who gets the award will have a good sized job on hand.
