

ALBERT IVES BOUND OVER TO APPEAR

Justice Bagley Thinks Evidence is Sufficient

CHARGE, UNLAWFUL COHABITATION

Two Witness Swear That Ives Lived With Widow

Justice H. T. Bagley Tuesday heard the examination of Albert Ives, under arrest on a charge of unlawful cohabitation with the widow of the late Darling Smith. Two witnesses were sworn on behalf of the state, Chas. Smith, son of Mrs. Smith, and a daughter of the co-defendant.

Each gave evidence which was considered sufficient, stating that to all intents and purposes the two lived together as man and wife. The daughter testified that she had seen them, at one time, occupying the same room. While it was not brought out in the evidence, yet it has been popularly supposed for some time that Ives and Mrs. Smith were married while on a trip out of the state.

Judge Bagley fixed the bail at \$800, in default of which Ives was remanded back to jail. As mentioned in last week's Argus, there is a big estate behind all this, the late Darling Smith providing in his will that should the widow marry she was to forfeit her life interest in the real estate, which is said to be worth from \$15,000 to \$20,000.

Jacob Wheeler, for some years a resident of near Reedville, owning the McMillen place, died at Santa Rosa, Cal., May 10, 1905, after an illness of about two months. He passed at one time owned a great deal of property in East Portland, which he sold for a large amount. He was born in Knox county, Tenn., May 1, 1828, and was 77 years of age. Six of his great uncles were in the War of the Revolution, and three of them were killed while the British carried the breastworks.

Company Expects to Have Entire Line Built by Autumn

Word is now given out by the officials of the Oregon Traction Company that active work will be commenced on the proposed electric line on the morning of June 2. The road is to start at lower Stark Street, and a big force of men will push construction as rapidly as possible. The line will run out of town through the Balch Gulch section, follow the Lafe Pence ditch a ways, and then strike over to Cedar Mill.

The San Francisco contractors will have their construction plant unladen and ready for business, and that we are now assured of another means of railway communication is a matter of gratification.

Miss Jessie Donelson sang a solo, "Sing Me to Sleep," which was heartily enjoyed, and she responded with another. W. O. Donelson furnished the stage settings, and the entire play was well connected and put on without a break. The orchestra was somewhat of a surprise and gave evidence of careful training. The players were: J. B. Wilkes and Earl Donelson, violins; Harry Bowman, cornet; Fred Sewell, French horn; F. J. Williams, clarinet; Irving Bath, trombone; O. G. Wilkes, bass, and Miss Jessie Donelson, pianist.
