Russian supremacy in Eastern Asia is now a thing of the past. She has lost all control of Manchuria, and the chances are that she will never again have the ascendancy. Russia may as well make peace terms and turn her attention to troubles at home, seeking only to promote real reforms rather than to punish those that have made capital out of their country's conflict. Russia has lost her power in the east because of incompetency—not of the soldiers and sailors, for they are brave—officers in command.

Ohio republicans are standing pat, and their platform tells us that there is nothing wrong with the tariff schedule. Meanwhile the revenues of the government are falling shorter and shorter each month. If this keeps up the administration will be forced to do the "Cleveland act," and issue bonds. And in the meantime the trusts, which stood so indignant at "encroachment of national honor" are getting their profits arbitrarily.

Why people should take from Carnegie without question and turn down John D. seems paradoxical. One made his money by a tariff that made competition impossible, and the other made his by buying out the opposition, or forcing them out and by making the railways break even with him.
