George Milne, some years ago employed at the Milne mill, was a Hillsboro visitor Sunday, being one of the W. O. W. team, visiting here and at Glencoe.

Ira E. Wheeler, of this city, is personally acquainted with Luther Burbank, the California scientist, and while at Santa Rosa, this month, talked with the wizard of the vegetable world. Ira says that his experimental garden is one of the wonders of the vegetable kingdom, and well worth a visit.

Captain Geo. A. Gore, who was well known in and around Tualatin, where his mother resided for years, died in Portland Sunday evening, aged 57 years. Captain Gore was master of the big Northern Pacific ferry, which transferred the trains at Kalama and Goble, and he was well known to all river and railway men in the Pacific northwest. He was a prominent Mason.

One of the largest crowds ever in attendance at the local cemetery at Decoration Day exercises was present Tuesday, witnessing the ritualistic services of General Ransom Post and the Woman's Relief Corps. The Hillsboro Reed & Cornet Band led the procession of veterans and relief corps to the cemetery, after which the G. A. R. went through their ritualistic exercises, followed by the W. R. C. The Ladies' Band was present at the cemetery, and assisted with numbers.

C. J. Mendenhall, of Buxton, writes the Weather Bureau: "Weather cloudy, with occasional rain; frost Thursday morning; ground too cool for rapid growth; early corn and wheat turning yellow; there will be a good crop of prunes and pears; gardens and late sown oats making slow growth; hops are making good advance ment, but are very uneven; many missing hills in both old and new yards; training on wires in progress; apples mostly a failure; cattle doing well; range good; potatoes making a good growth."

E. E. Brooks, of Scholls, troubled with senile decay, was brought to the county seat, Monday, and examined for sanity. Dr. Tamsieie made the examination, and the old gentleman, who is 77 years of age this Fall, was committed. The asylum authorities were notified and sent an attendant, the first experience under the new law, to convey the patient to the asylum. Judge Rood entered judgment against the family, who have a deed to the old man's farm, that they must pay the state \$10 per month for his keep. This is in conformity with the statutes of Oregon.

Calculators are sending out their figures, telling about how much it will cost to see the Fair. For those who are frugal it is estimated that lodging, one night, will cost \$1.00; three meals, \$1.00; admission to the Fair, \$.50; the Trail, \$.50; making a total, aside from car fare, of \$3.00 for each day viewing the Exposition. The management expects that there will be plenty of rooms in Portland for visitors, as there are several new hotels, while the big schools will also take lodgers, the terms having been completed. Certainly, one can spend a great deal more if they wish, but this is an economical estimate.

Dr. T. D. Bancroft, of Salda, Col., was in town last of the week, trying to get funds for aid in building a home for poor consumptives in Chaffee County, Col., where they already have a brick building erected. To aid the work the Doctor gives each donor a fac simile of a part of the official program used at the Ford theatre when Lincoln was assassinated. The Doctor was at the head of the stairs when the dying president was taken out, and a drop of the blood fell on the program. He picked it up and later presented it to the Kansas Historical Society. Very little money was given here, as people felt that charity "commenced at home."

Erwin Ritter, field assessor for Northeast Washington County, was in town Monday.

Wm. Bennett, one of Cornelius' substantial citizens, was a county seat visitor Monday.

H. H. Hendrix, of Cornelius, and one of the pioneers of that place, was in town Monday.

Miss Jessie Schulerich, who has been attending business college in Portland, was home the first of the week.

C. T. Crow this week started to set out an acre in celery on his rich bottom land north of town. If the vegetable grows as expected Hillsboro may rival Kalamazoo as a tonic producing region.

Arthur Bacon, of Bacona, was down Tuesday, and says that everything in the way of crops is looking fine this season. He says that the shingle industry is still booming up in the mountains.
