

TILLAMOOK RAILROAD OUT OF THIS CITY

Wm. Reid Wants Hillsboro
to Get Right of Way

WILL RUN NORTH TO BANKS

And Then Over the Hills to the City by
the Bay

Wm. Reid, the railway promoter, whose Portland company, comprised of some of the best and wealthiest citizens of Portland, among whom is T. B. Wilcox, has sold two and one half millions worth of bonds for the purpose of building a railroad to Tillamook, was in town yesterday and today, conferring with the Board of Trade. He asks that Hillsboro furnish the right of way to Banks, the line to tap the Southern Pacific at this place, and he says in the event that the right of way is given he will build from Hillsboro; if not he will go to Cornelius, as that town offers to get the desired rights.

The Acting President of the Board, Mayor B. P. Cornelius, and Secretary Heidel are taking the matter up, and they think that there is no question but what they can get the right of way. If they do, 20 miles of the road will be built by October 15, and Reid says his company wants the deeds to the land on which the line is located when the engine reaches Banks, and no sooner.

The Board of Trade met this afternoon, and Mr. Reid addressed the members and citizens attending, stating that the money was raised for the road; that they wanted the right of way; that if Hillsboro did not furnish Cornelius would; but that they would rather go out of Hillsboro, than any other route. Vice President Cornelius, upon motion, will appoint, tomorrow, a committee of seven, to be the chairman, to make arrangements to secure the right of way. Mr. Reid said the road would be built to Banks and in operation by December, and possibly before. He said his company was after the timber over in that country, and it was no trouble for them to raise bonds, as the big interests realized the worth of the Tillamook road.

Mr. Reid is said to be anxious to have the road run north by way of Glencoe, and this will tap a fine agricultural region. The directors of the company will guarantee the construction of the road in the time stated, which will greatly aid the committee on the right of way work.

CORNELIUS HAS A GRIEVANCE

To the Editor—
On behalf of the citizens of the city of Cornelius, I desire to inquire of the committee who had charge of the arrangements and program for Washington County Day at the Fair, why it was the officials of Cornelius were not consulted in any manner about the program. As the matter stands, our city was completely ignored. The undersigned, as Mayor of the city, was in attendance, the city was represented by a special car equally decorated with any other, and yet no one was consulted with reference to the make up of the program. The undersigned does not know who the committee on arrangements were, but the citizens of our little town take it somewhat to heart that our little city of four hundred and fifty inhabitants should not be recognized in any manner. This statement may be qualified, however, to the extent that Mr. Marsh, who resides four miles from the city limits, made some remarks on behalf of the city. So far, so good. But why not a citizen of Cornelius be given an opportunity to say something about the city who was directly interested, either as a citizen or as an official? To say the least, it is a very strange proceeding on the part of the committee, and the citizens of Cornelius so consider it, and feel to a certain extent that they have been insulted.

TUESDAY A BIG DAY AT LEWIS & CLARK

Washington County There in
all Her Glory

TEN COACHES OF VISITORS

Many Went in From Eastern County
by Team

Tuesday was Washington County day at the Lewis & Clark Fair, and the Southern Pacific carried ten coach loads of visitors to Portland and return. Hillsboro had four coaches; Forest Grove had four, Gaston one and Cornelius one. All were loaded to the guards and it was a merry excursion. B. P. Cornelius, Mayor, and Hon. W. N. Barrett, addressed the Fair visitors for Hillsboro; Hon. W. K. Newell, for the county; Hon. G. W. Marsh, for Cornelius, and Judge Hollis for Forest Grove.

Mayor Cornelius told his auditors that Hillsboro was the hub of the county, and that it was within two hours' drive of Portland, and one hour by rail. "You can get both soft and hard drinks at Hillsboro, and you do not need to search for a blind pig."

Judge Hollis told the people that Forest Grove was the prettiest town on the coast, while Mr. Marsh advised them that he expected Hillsboro and Forest Grove would each join at Cornelius, ultimately, and Cornelius would be the business center of the county.

It is estimated that Hillsboro and Forest Grove sent in 5000 visitors, each, while Cornelius and Gaston sent 100 each.

Forest Grove's excursion flower was the carillon, while the Hillsboro carried in express loads of roses. The Ladies Band and the Hillsboro Reed & Cornet Band accompanied the Hillsboro delegation, and made music while en route.

CORNER STONE LAID

The laying of the cornerstone for the new German Presbyterian Church of Bethany, took place Thursday afternoon, June 1, at four o'clock. A goodly number of people from the entire community had assembled to witness the ceremony. Besides the pastor of the church, Rev. Wm. C. Laube, there were present and took part in the exercises, Rev. J. A. H. Wutke, of the Baptist church of Bethany, Rev. J. Sohm, of the Bethany M. E. church, and Rev. Andrew J. Montgomery, Pastor of the Third Presbyterian church of Portland, and Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Portland.

Mr. Montgomery made the principal address, emphasizing the significance of this day to the Bethany church, as marking a new era in its history, and showing the great work that has been done and is still to be done in our great Northwest by the German speaking people. "We have but begun to lay the foundations, and there still remain great opportunities, religious and educational, as well as material. Pastor Laube then spoke in German, expressing his gratitude that the undertaking had progressed so far, and calling upon the people to be faithful in the future and to measure up to their great responsibility in laying the foundations of this great commonwealth for future generations.

The cornerstone is a gift of Mr. Otto Schuman, the wellknown sculptor of Portland. In a copper book was presented by Mr. J. J. Kaddery of Portland, were placed the following articles:

A German Bible, an English New Testament, a copy of the Westminster Catechism in German and English, a Calendar of the German Presbyterian Church for 1905, a copy of "Der Presbyter" paper, containing the photographs of the different ministers, who have served the Bethany Church, a copy of the Assembly Herald, a copy of "Our German Work," a short sketch of the history of the church, and, finally, a handful of Oregon wheat.

While Mr. Chris Schindler, the chairman of the Building Committee, and Mr. T. P. Goodin, the contractor, put the stone in its position, Mr. H. A. Kuratli spoke an appropriate recitation.

Besides his regular work at Bethany, Pastor Laube has now taken up work in Mountaineer, and will preach in the new Union church of that place on the third and fifth Sabbath in the month, at three and 8 P. M. The afternoon service will be in English, and the evening service in German. Friends in that community are heartily invited to attend.

The question as to whether a railway company can collect a fare if no seat is provided is likely to come before the courts as a result of an incident on the train of Conductor Chas. Cline, of the run past this city. Yesterday evening a travelling man boarded the train in Portland, and stood in the aisle beside Recorder Kuratli. Before the conductor collected fares the traveller tried to get Mr. Kuratli to agree not to pay unless seats were furnished. He said he had a ticket, but he would not pay unless he was furnished a place to sit down. Mr. Kuratli told him he would pay, even if he had no seat. When Cline came to the man he told him he would surrender his ticket provided he furnished a seat. As there was no seat, and the ticket was not forthcoming, Cline stopped the train at Shattuck and put the passenger off. He went back to Portland to employ an attorney. The man is named M. V. Bishop, and he hails from Everett, Wash. He says the Supreme Courts of several states back him up and he will make the "Espee" pay up and be good.

Edmund Lousignont, who was sentenced from Multnomah county, some time ago, for stealing a horse, afterward selling it to a North Yamhill farmer, escaped from the guards at Salem, Tuesday, while working on the public roads near the penitentiary. Lousignont is a native of this county, and was raised up back of Forest Grove. The officers do not think that he will come back to this county, but are of the opinion that he will make for Central Oregon and then make for east of the mountains, somewhere. All county sheriffs have been notified and there is a reward of \$50 offered for each escape.

JACKSON BOTTOM BRIDGE
The contract for the Jackson Bottom bridge, a half mile south of this city, was this afternoon awarded to S. M. Holland, who resides near the Johnson mill, South Tualatin. M. M. Mead will make the fills, and for this work he will receive \$848, he being the only bidder on the work. Mr. Holland will sign his bond at once and then work will commence. The bids on the bridge work ran all the way from nine thousand dollars down to a little less than five thousand. The various bids were as follows:

The court concluded to have fir piling and Mr. Holland was awarded the contract at \$4900. This will make the cost of the bridge and fill amount to \$5748.

The work will be completed as soon as the contractor can get his material on the ground, and travel will be commenced by the time of the early Fall rains.

The Cornelius bridge, south and near the Bennett place had but two bids, D. B. Reasoner, at \$279.20, and J. W. Goodin, the successful one, at \$233.

The county court will not finish before Saturday, and the other business transacted by that body will appear next week.

Referring to the Jackson Bottom bridge again, it might be well to state that the structure and fill will cost the county but \$3073, as there is a private subscription of \$2675, which is as good as the Bank of England, and will be paid at the completion of the work.

As at the hour of press it is learned that the court rejected the bids on the fill, and bids will again be asked.
