Royal Sampson, aged 68, died on May 4, and his wife, Ellen, soon thereafter filed letters asking that she be made executor of the last will of the deceased, she being the sole legatee of the instrument. Sheriff Connell went to Portland with the guard, as he didn't want to be burdened with two patients.

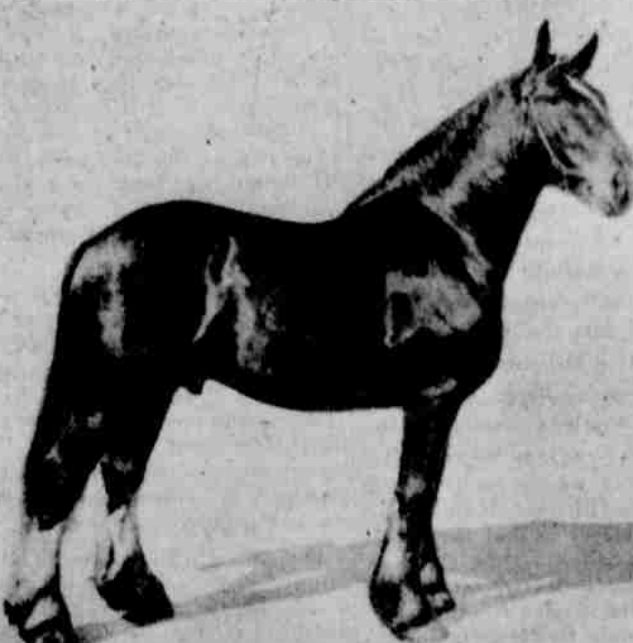
