FROM MR. McQUILLAN

Editor:—Will you be kind enough to give space for a few remarks on the dairy question?

The time has come when the dairymen of Washington County are practically depending upon the Condensers for a market for their milk. The Condensers when first established in Washington County, agreed with the patrons to do very differently to what they are doing today. They have brought the price of milk down so that it is worth but \$1 a ton less than a ton of bran, which the dairymen find to be the cheapest feed for their use. Now is the question, "Does it pay the people of Washington County produce milk and pay for having it delivered at the Condenser for \$1 a hundred or \$20 per ton?" Is it because the Condensers of this county cannot afford to pay any greater sum than \$1 a hundred, delivered at their Condensers? Has the time come when the dairymen of Washington County shall have to resort to the method that other classes of business men, laboring men and producers have already been compelled to do, and that is to organize to protect their own business interests. It seems to me that the Condensed Milk Companies are not treating their patrons as fairly as they might have done. Two years ago, being about the first summer the Condensed Milk Companies operated, they paid \$1.10 per hundred for the milk. Last summer they paid \$1.05 a hundred for the milk, and this summer \$1 per hundred, less five cents for hauling. Now it seems to me that the Condensed Milk Companies are treating the farmers and they are getting them pretty well treated. They are cutting them down five cents per hundred each summer and if this state of affairs continues, where and when will it stop? Now, my idea is the time has come when the farmers and dairymen of this

price of milk shall be. Of course, the farmer has nothing to say, as a rule, only work and pay taxes. Every business man fixes the price upon his goods and fixes the price of the goods of the farmer and he must apparently take what he gets and be satisfied. Now, in this case with the dairymen, it is not so. We have got the creameries yet, and with a very little warning they may be placed in operation again (which I have found the creameries are more profit than the Condensed Milk Company's business) and we have also got the Portland market at our back. We must do something different to what we have been doing in the past year or so, or we shall be compelled to dispose of our cows.

Now, let the people of this county congregate in small groups in their neighborhood and discuss the proposition to meet in county convention in the near future, and see if arrangements by way of an organization cannot be brought about, so that we can live and let live as we also expect the Condensed Milk Companies of this county to live and let live. We do not wish to see them go out of business, or any people that come here with an investment, but they ought to hear in mind that we as dairymen have to live as well as them.

If the people of the different localities of this county see fit to have a meeting called, I will be pleased to hear from as many as possible, or from a representative of each locality and will willingly call a County Convention at Hillsboro, Oregon, and do all that is fair and reasonable for the farmers and with a view that they can live and the Condensed Milk Companies also live and do business.

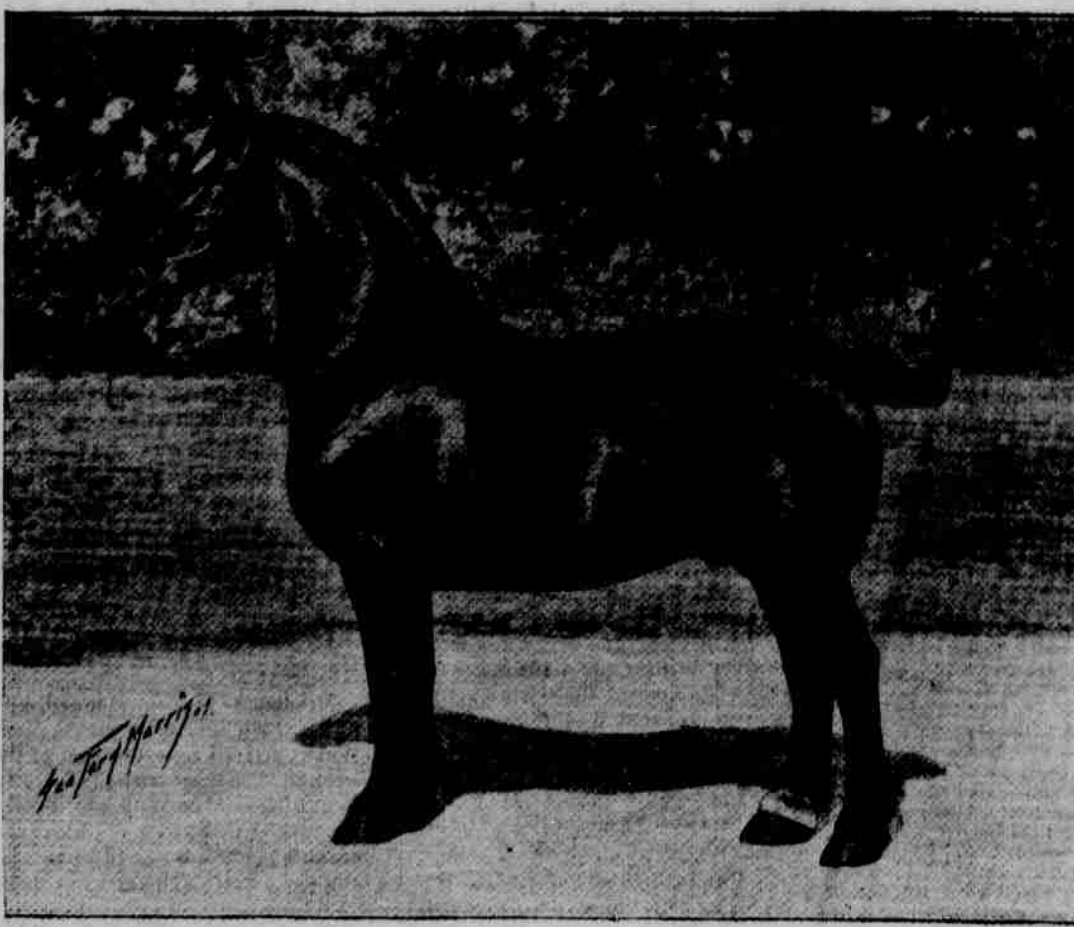
