BRONCHO BUSTING BY TWO CRACK RIDERS

Outlaw Horses Ridden in Local Horse Corral

GEORGE GIBSON IN EXHIBITION
Rides the Taylor Hill Outlaw Without Bridle

About 100 people witnessed some crack riding in the Wiley corral this forenoon. Warner, of Wallawa, had an outlaw, and a purse of \$250 was raised for Will Minor, who rode the animal until she jumped the fence and hung amidst ships. It was a clever piece of horsemanship, but the best exhibition followed, when Geo. Gibson, an old time east-of-the-mountains rider clothes pinned the H. Taylor Hill outlaw sorrel, owned by Josh Merrill, of Cornelius. This sorrel is being driven on the Forest Grove milk wagon, and he is the worst kind of an outlaw, bucking for a half hour, and bawling at every jump. Gibson rode him to a finish, pulling both bridle and halter off and giving him his head. The horse finally found his master and made through a board fence, entering the band, ready to quit—and he did quit.

The boys who witnessed the affair felt that they had the worth of their money, as no better riding was ever seen in "any man's" country, and they were satisfied with their expenditure of six or seven dollars.

THAT TIES ARE STREWN ON LINE
For the Portland-Hillsboro Electric Line

Butner, county commissioner, of Beaverton, was in town today and reports that the Oregon Traction Company yesterday commenced work on the Portland-Hillsboro electric line by depositing ties along Stark Street, the terminal street in Portland. This now removes all doubt as to the question of the construction of the road. Work has actually commenced.

Cornelius is going right ahead with preparations for her Fourth of July celebration, and everything is in readiness for the veterans' association, when they convene there on the 1st of the coming month.

Miss Tennessee Weathered has been employed to teach in the Hillsboro public school, and this completes the corps of instructors for the coming term. The same janitor will care for the building next year.

The Washington County exhibit at the Lewis & Clark Fair is being put into preentable appearance as rapidly as possible, and it will be augmented each week, as products mature. When the fruit ripens the Lewis & Clark Club expect to make it the most attractive exhibit in the Fair.

Dr. S. T. Linklater, who has seen some strange cases relative to maternity, tells the following true story of erratic motherhood. One day recently while on a visit to Walla Whitmore's, above Laurel, on a professional call, he was proved of the strange relationship that can exist between a cat and a skunk. Whitmore's feline had just presented him with a litter of kittens which were personae non grata, and the kits were killed. At the same time Whitmore's son killed a mother skunk and a part of her litter of babies, leaving two of the youngsters, which were immediately adopted by the mother cat, who took as much delight in nursing the foreigners as though they belonged to the cat family. Chief Engineer Davis, of the proposed Tillamook road, was in town yesterday and today, looking over the route out of the city, and a meeting is being held this evening to see whether or not a positive guarantee will be made giving them the right of way wherever they want the road to run. This move is brought about by the fact that Forest Grove, after consulting the farmers from that place to Banks, pledge to give the right of way free, and to put a bond in the bank as a guarantee of good faith. The meeting tonight expects to satisfy the promoters of the road it's now up to Hillsboro and outlying vicinity to "make good."

Judge DeHaven, sitting at Portland in the land fraud cases, has drawn a jury of 200 citizens in the state, and from these will be drawn the 12 men who will try Senator Mitchell on the charge of accepting money from land buyers while Senator. Washington county supplies the following on the venire: O. G. Barlow, Hillsboro, now of Portland; E. A. Eddy, Tualatin, Henry Hogrefe, South Tualatin, H. Taylor Hill, Prineville, now of Mountaineer; Thos. Paulsen, Garden Home, A. S. Vaughn, Middle-ton, Wm. Hay, Hillsboro (now deceased) and H. F. Gordon, Forest Grove. The trial of Senator Mitchell will begin June 19.

W. K. Traylor has returned from Dayton, Oregon, where Mrs. Traylor died at the home of her daughter, May 31. Deceased was born in Iowa, Dec. 10, 1849, and moved to Texas with her parents in 1856, residing there until 1883. In 1872 she was married to Mr. Traylor. They moved to Oregon in 1883, and settled on a homestead in Columbia county, Oregon, where they lived until 1897, when they moved to this county, residing south of town until 1902, when they moved to Hillsboro. A husband, two daughters and one son mourn her loss.

Frank Anderson, a son of Mrs. M. E. Anderson and a brother of Willis Anderson, arrived from Pittsburg, Pa., Tuesday morning, accompanied by his wife. They will visit here several weeks and incidentally visit the Lewis & Clark. Mr. Anderson is an engineer on the Pennsylvania Railway. Many will remember him when he was at home on the East Tualatin Plains.

The Hillsboro postoffice pay for the postmaster has been increased from \$1400 to \$1500 per year. This is for salary alone, and does not include that allowed for clerk and deputy hire. This is one hundred per annum less than Forest Grove's postoffice, which enjoys a considerable patronage from the body of students that attend Pacific University.

Noah Job, who crossed the plains in 1845 with the Cornelius family and Wm. Walters and parents, was a welcome caller here Tuesday. He leaves the last of the week, if feeling better, for Kamiah, Idaho, where he will visit his daughter, Mrs. Frank Pomeroy.

Herman Schulmerich today made the totals for Forest Grove's census, and finds that there are 1620 people inside the city limits. As Hillsboro has about 1400 inside the limits it will be seen, after taking out the student body, the county seat is not so far behind the sister city.
