

WARRANT IS ISSUED BUT WOMAN IS GONE

Charged With Unlawful Co-habitation With Ives

THE DEFENDANT IS IN WASHINGTON

Constable Went to Serve Papers but Finds no One

The case of the State of Oregon versus Mrs. Darling Smith is at last brought to a focus through a warrant being issued for the arrest of the widow. Special Constable Sappington went to the place Sunday, but found she was gone, and it is understood that she is at Vancouver, Wash.

The warrant was issued at the instance of the son, who swore to the complaint when E. A. Ives was arrested for unlawful cohabitation with the widow. Ives was bound over, laid in jail for a time, and secured his release by depositing a cash bail of \$800 for appearance at circuit court next Fall.

It is reported that Mrs. Smith had an altercation with her children a few days ago, and that she physically worsted them, and the warrant followed. This is the case where a big estate is involved, the husband leaving the widow a life interest in the estate so long as she remained a widow.

PETER SPIERINGS

Peter Spierings, a prominent farmer of near Greenville, died Tuesday evening, July 27, 1905, from an attack of pneumonia. Deceased was born at Freedom, Wis., March 31, 1864, and came to Oregon with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Spierings, in 1875. He was married to Catherine Gleason in Portland, June 7, 1889, and to the union seven children survive, the youngest being about 2 years of age. His mother died about 10 years ago, but the father survives.

Mr. Spierings was honest and reliable and bore a splendid reputation in his neighborhood. He was a member of the Verboort Catholic Church, and a member of the Catholic Order of Foresters, under whose auspices the funeral took place at Verboort this morning. Besides the wife and children, and the aged father, he leaves the following brothers and sisters: Joseph, Albert and Chas. Spierings, and Meadames Mary Vandomelon, Victor Crop and Henry Duyck, to mourn his loss.

It will be remembered by many that the late John Spierings, who died at Manila, during the Spanish American War, was a brother of deceased.

COUNTY CENSUS IS MUCH INCREASED

Assessor Willcox Thinks it Will go to 20,000

BIG INCREASE IN FIVE YEARS

Ran Away Ahead of National Census in 1900

Assessor George H. Willcox is busy these days making up his assessments and incidentally tabulating the census returns. He states that he believes the county census will reach pretty close to the 20,000 mark. This is a big gain on the National census of five years ago, and speaks well for immigration and lack of race suicide. All of one thousand of this increase is due to the growth of Forest Grove and Hillsboro. The census of 1900 was 14,467.

This increase, however, is nothing to what the percentage of increase will be in the next five years.

The report to the contrary, Jos. Cawse did not plead guilty in the recorder's court, last week, but was dismissed. George Billings pleaded guilty, but submitted evidence to show degree of guilt. The court, then, this forenoon, took up the cases against P. B. Southworth, who pleaded guilty to disorderly, a week ago Sunday, and then went on trial for assault and battery in the same case mentioned last week. Attorney Geo. R. Bagley, after some evidence had been submitted, attacked the validity of the ordinance, and the recorder finally decided that he would hear briefs on the matter. The ordinance was passed during the time Warren Dobbins was recorder, in 1894, and the journal does not show that the measure was read the third time and carried, although it says that a motion to read it and bring it to its final passage was carried. Geo. R. Bagley and T. H. Tongue Jr. will file the briefs, Bagley for the defense and Tongue for the city.

One man, for whom Mitchell hurried a pension through, said: "Mitchell is as innocent as a child. If he got any money for work back in Washington he was entitled to it." When told there was a statute against this he said that such a law "was unconstitutional, anyway," and besides, he said, "Tanner and Robertson are both liars." When explaining that Tanner perjured himself before the federal grand jury to save Mitchell he walked away in disgust and said that this whole business was the "work of Joe Simon, by Gosh!"

Justice H. T. Bagley Tuesday heard the case of Geo. R. Bagley versus M. B. Bump, as administrator of the estate of the late Ellen L. Ford, for a \$25 attorney fee. The plaintiff presented the bill to the administrator after the death of Mrs. Ford, who suicided last Fall. The claim was disputed as Mr. Ford claimed that she had settled with Mr. Bagley. The plaintiff proved that the work was not finished until some time after Mrs. Ford committed suicide, and therefore, at the time of her death there was nothing due. The services were practically all furnished after death although started before, and the Court gave him judgment for \$25 and his costs, which the estate must pay.
