All Over the Failure of Proper School Levy

Last week the Argus published an article signed by Messrs. M. H. Henderson, H. G. Fitch and Geo. Mooberry, as a committee for the Cornelius school meeting, and the language used was very strong, and, according to the statements of leading lawyers, borders on criminal libel.

The Argus was derelict in publishing the same, and hereby apologizes for publishing the resolution, as it knows that personally the members of the county board are honorable men, whatever may have been their omission in not levying a proper school tax.

That any one has a right to criticize the action of the board is a foregone conclusion, but one should be a trifle careful in the use of language. This paper stands ready to make publication of any article that will set the matter right.
