

STUNG TO DEATH BY HONEY BEES

David Campbell, of Hillsboro,
Passes Away

A PECULIAR CASE OCCURS HERE

Was Taking Honey From Hive at J. M. Greer's

David Campbell, for many years a resident of this city, passed away at 2:00 o'clock yesterday morning, in this city, death being caused by stings from honey bees. Mr. Campbell came up town Tuesday evening, and did some trading at the Dennis store. From there he went to the house of J. M. Greer, on Third street, to take honey away from a hive of bees. About eight o'clock in the evening he was found by a member of the Greer family. Campbell was unconscious, and showed evidence of having been attacked about the head by the bees. He was taken to the house and Dr. F. A. and F. J. Bailey called. He rallied some, but expired from heart failure, at two the next morning. The theory of death was that the virus from the bees had passed into the blood circulation similar to the manner in which the poison from a rattlesnake enters the system. The stings about the temple, where the epidermis is not very thick, afforded a means for the poison to quickly get into the arteries.

Deceased was the father of the late Parley Campbell, who perished on the Jackson Bottom Lake a few months ago.

Deceased was born in Illinois, August 9, 1844, and came to Oregon with his parents, in 1853, settling on a homestead near Laurel, five or six miles south of this city. He was married to Agnes Fleming, Dec. 25, 1873, and but one child survives, Mrs. Estella Hoover, of this city. Parley, a son, was killed to death in the lake south of town, last January, while he, Ed. Adkins and Roy Moore were out for a pleasure trip. Mr. Campbell had just received the news of the death of a sister, Elizabeth Hunter, of Prineville, three brothers survive, all well known to early pioneers: Wm. Campbell, Spokane, Wash., Geo. of Laurel, and Elder J. A. Campbell, of Portland, and who preached in Oregon for many years as a Christian minister. The funeral took place today from the Christian Church, interment being in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

FORTY FIVE BALES CHOICE HOPS BURNED

Commissioner C. B. Buchanan
Suffers Loss of Hop House

BUT TEN BALES WERE SAVED

Fire Occurred at Four O'clock Wednesday Evening

The hop house of Chas. B. Buchanan, county commissioner, burned near Cornelius, Wednesday afternoon, about four o'clock, and with it 45 bales of choice hops went up in smoke. The fire suddenly burst forth from the southeast corner of the building, and only ten bales of the product were saved. There was an insurance of \$3,000 on the building and contents, John Vandewal being the agent who wrote the policy.

No one seems to know how the fire started, and there is some idea that it is the work of an incendiary. It is a strange coincidence that the warehouse at North Yamhill burned the first of the week, and in it were a large amount of hops. Mr. Trullinger, a son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Zina Wood, of this city, lost over a hundred bales.

Judge McBride granted an injunction against C. F. Crow entering upon the home premises, and also prohibiting him from interfering with Mrs. Crow. Crow went out to the place Tuesday night, after all was still, and forced his way into the house. Mrs. Crow was gone and Crow proceeded to take possession. He was found the next morning by Deputy Sheriff Kane and brought into town and placed in jail. When found Crow was in the barn sound asleep, holding to the handle of a double bit ax. W. H. Wehrung and Wehrung & Sons had attached all of the Crow wood and their attorneys agreed to look out for Crow, no nothing was done as punishment for the contempt of court on the part of the defendant.

Crow was released from custody this afternoon, and will be at liberty during good behavior.

The case of the appeal of Carl Husemoller, of Dilley, against Geo. Eason, was thrown out of court on demurrer, yesterday. Some time ago Eason sued Husemoller for a commission on real estate, Eason having procured a purchaser for the Husemoller farm. The purchaser agreed to the purchase price, and so he paid \$500 down and took a bond for a deed. After awhile the purchaser tired of his bargain and forfeited the \$500. Eason had been given \$40 on account and Husemoller refused to pay more. Eason brought suit before a Forest Grove justice and was given a verdict. Husemoller appealed the case and H. T. Bagley defended Eason's interests. Attorney Bagley argued that the case was not in court owing to statutory requirements, and Judge McBride allowed his motion to dismiss. Husemoller must, therefore, pay the \$110 verdict awarded Eason in justice court.

CONTRACTS ARE NOW BEING SIGNED

Graders and Bridge Man in
City Wednesday

CONSULTING WITH CHIEF DAVIS

Expect to Let Contracts For Line This Week

The grade contractors came out from Portland Wednesday morning, as well as one bridge man, to look over the railroad work between this city and Banks, and their bids are expected here today. The proposals will be opened by Chief Engineer Geo. L. Davis, this evening, and by the end of the week it is expected that contracts will be let for both constructing the grade, and for building bridges.

Engineer Rankin is surveying for the two bridges just north of town, and he has finished considerable of the cross section, so the engineers are ready for the sub-contractors just as soon as they can be in readiness for work.

SUE FOR RIGHTS

The Portland, Nehalem and Tillamook Railway Company has brought suits against three property owners for condemnation proceedings in the matter of rights of way. The company sues Richard Beamish, on the Wm. Connell estate, for 432 acres, and alleges they offered him \$250, which was refused; M. S. Woodman, of Banks, is sued for 217 acres for which they offered him \$150, which was refused; and E. T. Turner is sued for a strip of .66 of an acre in Banks, for which they offered \$125, which was also refused. The company asks the court to condemn the various tracts and ask for their costs and disbursements. S. B. Huston, W. N. Barrett, Geo. R. Bagley and E. B. Tongue are attorneys for the railroad.

The cases will doubtless be tried August 1, provided they are not settled before that time, which is highly improbable.
