BONES OF PAUL JONES

A Forest Grove newspaper has been trying the right of way cases in its columns, under the direction, no doubt, of the attorney for Banks property owners, and the paper has said, or insinuated, some very complimentary things about the "Hillsboro jury," etc. Just as though a party to a suit could not in all fairness exclude from the trial of the case any person or persons who would have had Hillsboroophobia. There are always two sides to a question. The Hillsboro committee promised the right of way to the railroad which will leave this place and tap Tillamook via Banks. That promise covered the line as far as Banks. The committee raised several thousand dollars, and it has procured the right of way. The committee is getting the railroad. It will not be a "stump" either. But if Forest Grove's newspaper men want the Hillsboro committee to get it something they are in the field for the services, and they will work reasonable. As the Argus has repeatedly said, Forest Grove has a lot of fine fellows, but the town has always been unfortunate in its newspaper acquisitions. It is a good thing that judges take cognizance of this principle of fair play, and permit no one on a jury who would be apt to violate the ethics of justice for either party to a case. Bones of Paul Jones—suppose a plaintiff or defendant would be forced to take 12 Forest Grove newspaper men on a jury!

All the right of way has been settled, rather than to go to court, and in each instance parties received practically the market price for their land—barring those, of course, who donated the right to pass through their farms.

Read the vital statistics of Washington County, in another column, and you will see that the county is doing. Our nearly 17,000 people are certainly a factor in the State Oregon. As to the crop production for last year, it is hardly a fair representation of what we can do, as the hay and grain crop was not half a yield. However, a short yield is an exception.

With Hillsboro as a terminal the Tillamook railroad will be several miles nearer to Portland than had Forest Grove been the starting point, and this with the loss of but a mile of road building. What is the use of Forest Grove's papers carping about the eternal fitness of things?
