

WORK PROGRESSING ON ROAD TO BANKS

J. C. Hare is Clearing Way
With Crew of Sixteen

BRIDGE WORK STARTS NEXT WEEK

Timbers and Piling are Now Being
Delivered

Work on the Portland, Nehalem & Tillamook Railway between this city and Banks is progressing finely, considering that Chief Engineer Geo. L. Davis has been on the grounds, actively, but a trifle over 30 days. All but two miles of the line between here and the objective point, Banks, has been contracted for. Loui Rose & Company have graded nearly a half mile close to the city, and they will finish the first mile in a fortnight, or three weeks; Thompson Bros., of Mountaineers, have over three miles adjoining, and they are now getting their camp ready to grade; A. E. Knotts, of Oswego, has taken the work for over three miles beyond Thompson Bros.' contract, and expects to move up in a few days and begin grading; J. C. Hare has a crew of sixteen men clearing right of way, and they will soon have the entire line to Banks ready for the graders; Carl Larsen is cutting and delivering the piling for the bridges north of town; Thompson Brothers, Carstens Bros. & Hartley, and Davies Bros. are delivering bridge timbers and ties along the line, and everything is getting along swimmingly.

Work will begin on Bridge No. 1 next week, the pile driving crews being due to arrive and start work by Monday. Two pile drivers will be placed in commission. The Portland Bridge Company will construct the bridge clear through to Banks, and their contracts have been signed up by the San Francisco people.

Crews of engineers are working beyond Banks and as soon as possible Mr. Davis will give more time to the territory beyond that point.

Engineer Rankin is doing the field work from this point out and a considerable part of the cross-section is made. Engineer Thomas, at the Hillsboro office, is getting things into good shape—and by September 15 there will be hope of early connection by rail between the two points, when Mayor Cornelius will be very likely to repeat to Mayor J. C. Schulmerich, of Banks, that celebrated passage of speech which took place between the two governors of the Carolinas.

OLIVER CHOWNING INDICTED TWICE

Indictment Alleges two Sales
of Liquor to Witnesses

DILLEY MAN IS NOW UNDER BONDS

Circuit Court and Transactions of the
Week, Therein

Circuit Court has had plenty to do this week. Harris Allen, District Attorney, yesterday morning presented two indictments against Oliver Chowning, of Dilley, charging him with selling liquor without a county license, and Judge McBride left the present bond of \$500 as Chowning's assurance that he would be present at the November term of court, to answer the charge of the State. The two witnesses before the district attorney were E. B. Sappington and Walter Johnson.

Chowning was brought down Tuesday eve by Deputy Sheriff Kane, but the prisoner was not placed in jail, the old bond obtaining.

S. B. Huston, as counsel for Chowning, requested that the case go over to the November term.

Case of Harriet R. Davis vs W. L. Davis, suit for money, dismissed without costs.

All the remaining jurors were excused for term, as follows: Ed. Schulmerich, O. G. Wilkes, E. L. Abbott, H. Koehnke, John Heiler and A. P. Luther.

E. J. Hubbard, of Dilley, was appointed bailiff for the term.

Hugh Brenner, held as a result of the Dilley gallon-house fire, was discharged from custody, District Attorney Allen having a returned true bill.

The court this morning gave Emma Giltner White a decree of divorce from Eugene D. White, of Portland. He gave Mrs. White all the property in her own name and denied White's petition for an equity of \$2000 in the same.

J. W. Shute vs Washington County, suit to enjoin county from collection of additional tax levied by Equalization Board, decided in favor of plaintiff.

E. W. Haines vs Shook; decree for plaintiff.

Littlehale vs Baseline Lumber Co., dismissed.
