BEAVERTON WANTS MONEY FOR STREETS

Asks the County Commissioners to Set Aside Tax

WANT GOOD THOROUGHFARES Mayor and Councilmen Unite in Petition

Mayor F. M. Robinson and Councilmen W. E. Squires, John Henry and Alfred Davies, of Beaverton, have filed a petition with the county board, asking that the road tax collected on property in the village of their residence be set aside and given to the town for the purpose of keeping up the streets.

A petition signed by W. McQuillan and others was also filed with the board this week, asking for a new bridge across the Tualatin, below Newton, on the road leading to the section south of Newton and Reedville.

The court will close its October session tonight, most likely. The claims allowed, and the business of the meeting will be published next week.
