## THE BIG ONION KING GOES AFTER SCALPS

### Swears out Ouster Proceedings in Court

#### AFTER MAYOR F. M. ROBINSON

##### Complaint Says Neither Mayor nor Davies is Eligible

The little city of Beaverton, just west of the Portland Mountain, is excited over the possibility of losing her Mayor, Dr. F. M. Robinson, and one Councilman, Albert Davies. Some months ago the City Council decided to put a stop to the shipping in of fertilizer, which is used in large quantities by the colony of gardeners from whom the village receives its chief support.

An ordinance was passed prohibiting the importation of fertilizer and garbage, and David Reghito, known all over the county as the "Onion King," decided to test the statute. Accordingly he ordered a carload shipment of manure and garbage from Portland, and the Southern Pacific shipped it into the city limits, which was prohibitive ground. An arrest followed, and Reghito was fined \$15, or seven and one-half days in the County Jail. Reghito was never confined, as his attorney Geo. R. Bagley, procured his release on a writ of habeas corpus, pending a writ of review before the Circuit Court, on the ground that the city was not authorized under the charter to pass such an ordinance.

Immediately upon his release Reghito's attorney discovered that the charter of the little village provided that only a person having property upon which he paid a tax was eligible to hold the offices of Mayor and Councilmen, and ouster proceedings have been filed against Mayor Robinson and Councilman Davies.
