

CIRCUIT COURT FINES A HUNDRED DOLLARS

A. G. Watson Pays Fine For Contempt

CASE FROM PROHIBITION TOWN

Court Holds his Order Denied "Conduct" of Saloon

Judge T. A. McBride last Saturday afternoon imposed a fine of \$100 on A. G. Watson as punishment for "conducting" a saloon at Forest Grove, contrary to an injunction issued last spring. On April 6, 1905, the court issued an injunction decreeing that the City of Forest Grove had no right to issue a saloon license to A. G. Watson because of a prohibitory charter, and with this an order was made enjoining Watson from conducting a saloon.

The defendant went home—he and C. F. Miller were partners—and transferred, through the revenue office and the wholesale companies, his stock to Miller. Watson remained with Miller and the place was opened. To get evidence against the resort one Rev. Luther Mahone, a Congregational minister, of Astoria, went to Forest Grove, and, into the saloon, told Watson he and others were going on a fishing expedition. Mahone bought a flask of whiskey and this was placed in evidence. Mahone went on the stand and swore that he tasted the liquor and he knew it was whiskey. He stated that he visited the place several times and saw liquor and money pass over the bar; that the resort was equipped just like an ordinary saloon, with a front and back bar and with liquor bottles behind.

Harrison Allen, who was running the resort, was also in evidence. He testified that as he was working for a saloon he was not guilty of intent to enact contempt. The court, however, said that in his opinion his order covered all phases of the case and he therefore sentenced Watson to pay \$100 fine or the option of 60 days imprisonment. Watson's attorney filed notice of appeal but later his client paid the fine, deciding to do this and await the action of the Supreme Court on the case that was appealed last spring.

CHURCH DEDICATION

On November 26 a large congregation assembled at the Tualatin Plains Presbyterian Church to dedicate the annex which was built last spring. Rev. Dr. Dunning preached the sermon. Special music was rendered by Mr. Wm. Robb and the Misses Robb and Esther Chalmers.

The debt against the new building was quickly and cheerfully raised, and the trustees presented the keys to the pastor. A processional hymn was sung and the congregation marched from the main building into the annex. Appropriate service was then conducted. Mr. Francis Chalmers delivered a historical sketch of the Tualatin Plains Presbyterian church, which was of deep interest, especially to those who constitute the present membership.
