Board of Physicians Report Mental Incapacity

MARY NORTHRUP CAMPBELL

Mrs. Mary Northrup Campbell died at The Dalles the past week. A year ago Mrs Campbell wrote her autobiography, which follows:

"I, Mary N. Campbell, nee Mary Ann Northrup, was born in Tillamook county, Oregon, June 9, 1868, being the daughter of Harvey and Sarah Northrup. Grandparents on both sides and father were emigrants of 1845. At the age of 4 years, in the year 1872, I moved with my parents to Glencoe, Washington county, Oregon, where I received my early training in the Shady Brook country school. In the fall of 1884 I attended school in Hillsboro, Oregon, remaining there until June 1885. Then I spent two years in the Portland public and high schools. In the fall of 1887 I began teaching in the public schools of Washington county, and with the exception of one year spent at the Oregon State Normal, I have taught almost continuously in the public schools of Oregon, considering this one of the greatest opportunities to do good and impress righteous principles in the hearts of the youth.

"I was married to W. A. Burt Campbell on December 22, 1897, and six months later moved to The Dalles, where I have resided ever since. On November 13, 1898, a son named Loyal Bonheur, blessed our union and stayed with us but three short months, dying February 4, 1899. I joined the United Brethren church at the age of 13 and have ever since sought to lead an earnest Christian life.

Mrs. Campbell leaves beside her husband, W. A. Burt Campbell, a father, H. Northrup, whose home is at Glencoe, Oregon; two sisters, Mrs. Sadie Smith, of Hillsboro, and Mrs. Emma Hickenbotham, Caldwell, Idaho, and six brothers, Maurice Northrup, of Idaho; Edward and Alonzo Northrup, of Glencoe; Chas. Northrup, of Wasco; Fred Northrup, of Glencoe, and Bert Northrup, who is in the navy at San Francisco.

Gets Life Sentence.

boy's grandmother, a lady for whom I have the greatest esteem, called at my office and asked me to do what I could to give the boy a fair

medical commission to examine in to the lad's mental condition, and you appointed three physicians, Drs. Linklater, F. A. Bailey, and W. D. Wood. They agree that the boy is mentally unbalanced, yet each thinks that he in some way knew right from wrong, and that he knew, when he committed this deed, it was wrong.

Dr. Linklater thinks that the boy is of about two-thirds' wit; Dr. Bailey thinks the boy knew he was committing a wrong, but is mentally irresponsible; and Dr. Wood thinks the defendant's responsibility is about five years behind his age—equalling that of a boy of perhaps ten years.

Since being retained in this case I have kept away from the boy, as the Sheriff and his deputy will testify, so that those so inclined could not say that I had conceived the story of mental incapacity or of his having a weak mind. I have concluded therefore, in lieu of the physicians' report, to waive the question of age, and enter a plea of guilty to murder in the second degree and have the defendant take life imprisonment as his sentence."
