WEHRUNG PRESIDENT

Hon. W. H. Wehrung was again elected president of the Northwest Racing Association, at Portland, this week, and the board has decided to have races at Seattle, Salem, North Yakima, Spokane, Walla Walla and Lewiston. The enormous purses of \$75,000 will be prizes for competition by Northwest horsemen. M. D. Wisdom was elected secretary and treasurer.

It is time that orchardists did something if we are to have any fruit. The San Jose scale is doing deadly work in many orchards, and inside of two years we shall have nothing but dead trees unless some hard work is done in exterminating this pest. The scale is a very small parasite that attacks the bark, sucking all the sap from the trees. The scale, individually, is not larger than a mark made by the point of a blunt pencil, and it infests the bark of fruit bearing trees in myriads. After about two seasons of multiplication the tree dies. Commissioner Newell, of Dilley, is talking of holding a meeting here to discuss the question, and it will be necessary to take speedy action and have the law followed unless the fruit future is to be destroyed.

Dr. S. T. Linklater, who went with Coroner Brown to examine the dead man found below Cedar Mill, expects to soon hear something of the man's identity, as he wore a hat with the trade mark of Drayfoss, a Spokane dealer, and had a pair of cuff buttons with a bridge bit for a pattern. He had on a black coat and vest, and black trousers with a faint white stripe in them. The doctor is not satisfied that there was not foul play, but the man may have committed suicide.

Sheriff Connell now has but two prisoners in the county jail. One is Mrs. B. F. Willis, serving a three months' sentence and the other is Oliver Chowing, in for 150 days for liquor sale without license. The Court recently made an order that male prisoners will be required to work on the county roads and it is the intention of the sheriff's office to follow the order of the court as soon as road work begins.

WET TICKET CHARGES TREACHERY

M. Peterson Elected Mayor and Entire Ticket Elected

Forest Grove Monday elected the dry ticket by a majority of from 45 to 60, and M. Peterson, is the new Mayor. This means that a strenuous fight will be put up against the saloon people, and, no matter what the Supreme Court does the last of this week when it decides the appeal taken against Judge McBride, who decided the old city council had no power to grant a license. So, then, strenuous times may be expected to come to pass at the college city.

The other officers are: W. B. Harris, L. L. Hollinger, and S. B. Starrett, councilmen for two years; A. G. Hoffman and C. B. Campbell, councilmen for one year; J. C. Clark, recorder; W. S. Hudson, treasurer; J. G. Lennow, marshal.

The opposition ticket charges that many of the voters interested in a wet town voted with the "dry" in order to give them a year of administration and litigation, confidently expecting a reversal at the next election.
